Did you know the chief funding source for conservation efforts in the United States is primarily the Wildlife and Sport Fish Restoration program (WSFR)? Established in 1937 as the Pittman-Robertson Act, this program imposes a federal excise tax on the sale of sporting goods, which includes firearms, ammunition, archery equipment, fishing tackle, and motorboat fuel. Taxes collected by the federal government are distributed back to states to fund various conservation initiatives, such as habitat restoration, wildlife management, research and monitoring, and public education and outreach.

Over the years, the WSFR program has played a crucial role in the recovery of many species, conserving millions of acres of habitat and promoting sustainable hunting and fishing practices. In addition to the WSFR program, other public funds also support conservation efforts in the United States, such as the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF), the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF), and the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF).

The Izaak Walton League of America (IWLA), a conservation organization founded in 1922 by a group of outdoor enthusiasts, has been a vocal advocate for the WSFR program and other federal programs that support conservation efforts in the United States. In addition, the IWLA has worked to educate the public about the importance of the WSFR program and has helped secure funding for various conservation initiatives across the country.

One success story of the WSFR program is the restoration of the brook trout population in Virginia. The Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources (VDWR) used funds from the WSFR program to launch a program focused on habitat restoration, pollution reduction, and the elimination of nonnative fish species. The VDWR also implemented regulations to protect the brook trout population. Thanks to these efforts, the brook trout population in Virginia has significantly recovered.

Other notable success stories of the WSFR program include the restoration of wild turkeys, the recovery of bald $\,$

eagles, the conservation of wetlands, the restoration of elk populations, and the improvement of fisheries management.

Virginians Poised to Impact IWLA Congressional Agenda

Virginia members of Congress are poised to have a big impact on Izaak Walton League priorities in 2023. The new congressional district maps mean new territory for some members, and committee assignments are now complete for the new Congress.

Rep. Abigail Spanberger (D-7) represents north-central Virginia, including Dale City, Stafford, and Fredericksburg. She serves on the House Agriculture Committee and is the highest-ranking Democrat on the Conservation Subcommittee, which has responsibility for conservation programs that help farmers adopt better conservation systems.

As Congress writes a new Farm Bill in 2023, Representative Spanberger will be in an important position to help the League put soil health at the center of agricultural policy, protect the \$19.5 billion Congress earmarked for climate-smart farming practices last summer, and increase long-term funding for conservation programs. Today a shortfall of funds means three-quarters of farmers who apply for help through farm conservation programs are turned away.

Senators Mark Warner and Tim Kaine both serve on the Senate Budget Committee. They represent the whole Commonwealth and their position on Budget means they could play an important role in ensuring that adequate funding is available for the Agriculture Committees as they write a new Farm Bill. Their work will also determine how much federal funding is available for other federal programs, like the Chesapeake Bay Program that funds

solutions to the pollutants harming the bay, and the North American Wetlands Conservation Act that helps protect and manage vital wetlands.


Rep. Gerald Connolly (D-11) represents suburban northern Virginia communities like Fairfax, Reston, and the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter property. Representative Connolly serves on the Oversight Committee, which can review and investigate any federal program the committee deems appropriate.

Rep. Rob Wittman (R-1) represents east-central Virginia, his district wraps around Richmond.
Representative Wittman serves on the Natural Resources Committee which will be considering the Grasslands Act, a proposal supported by the League. The bill would create a national strategy to protect and restore our disappearing grasslands and would educate and provide help to landowners to protect and restore prairie, savannahs, and other grasslands.

Rep. Jennifer Wexton (D-10) and Rep. Ben Cline (R-6) both serve on the House Appropriations Committee, which debates funding for federal agencies. Representative Wexton serves northern Virginia, from Leesburg southeast to Manassas and west to Sperryville. Rep. Ben Cline (R-6) represents the Shenandoah Valley, from Winchester to Roanoke.

Both can have an impact on a variety of priorities like the Chesapeake Bay Program, the National Park Service budget, clean energy, and Fish & Wildlife Service refuges. Representative Cline will serve on the Agriculture

Did You Know ... An Occasional Column Highlighting Something Interesting About the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, IWLA.

Did you know the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., IWLA, is involved with Fairfax County's Deer Management Program?

First, a brief history. After Fairfax County recorded its first deer-vehicle collision with a fatality in 1997, the county's supervisors mandated the initiation of the county's Deer Management Program, which is overseen by the county's police department and its partners, the county's park authority and NoVAParks. These agencies develop and implement a safe and humane deer culling program at selected parks in Fairfax County.

As local deer hunters and conservationists know, the county's White Tail deer population is thriving without natural large predators and significant hunting. While a healthy ecosystem can support 15-20 deer/sq. mile without damage to the environment, many sites in Fairfax County are estimated to contain 40-100 deer/sq. mile. That results in: risks to drivers colliding with deer (Virginia ranks 13th in the nation for the likelihood of such collisions); a higher risk to human health from the primary vector of Lyme disease—black-legged ticks—that feed and mate primarily on deer; irreversible damage to native plant life and woodland habitat (a single adult deer can eat over one ton of vegetation every year); loss of biodiversity and fewer species supported in the ecosystem; a decrease in overall herd health as more deer compete for fewer resources; along with other negative impacts to the ecosystem, humans, and the deer herds themselves. High deer density also contributes to the spread of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD), which is highly transmissible among deer and always fatal to the deer it infects.


An approved method to humanely reduce deer herds includes archery, a pillar activity of this IWLA Chapter. As approved by the Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources, harvesting of deer using qualified bow hunters has proven to be a safe, efficient, and cost-effective method of culling herds size in urban counties, like Fairfax. This Chapter plays a key role in qualifying the prospective bow hunters and many Chapter members also participate as hunters in the county program.

Of the 650 bow hunters seeking to be drawn in a lottery for 500 park hunting permits, about 100-150 qualify at the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter's archery range. To qualify for the lottery, a prospective hunter must shoot three arrows at a $6\frac{1}{4}$ inch surface from 20 yards away, hitting the target with all three arrows. If successful, the bow hunter must then shoot three more arrows at the same target from

30 yards away and hit the target with a minimum of two arrows. Failing to hit the target with the required number of arrows eliminates the shooter. While the bow hunter may attempt to hit the target a total of three separate times, failure to do so disqualifies the bow hunter from that year's lottery.

The Chapter also has a deer cleaning station for Chapter members to use and the Chapter hosts a freezer for hunters to store their deer heads which are later collected and tested by wildlife agency personnel for CWD, which is very difficult to detect in living deer. CWD cannot be detected solely based on visible signs and requires laboratory testing of harvested deer. While there are no known cases of CWD having been transmitted to humans, the disease is easily transmitted among overabundant deer herds. The popularity of deer hunting by Chapter members is evidenced by the number of deer heads left in the freezer during the 2022 hunting season: approximately 70 heads, making it one of the top three deer-head collection sites for CWD surveillance in Fairfax County.



You are cordially invited to join your fellow shooters to the spirited ARL-FX IWLA Cap'n Skrappy's Masters of Skrap shoots held throughout the year.

What is skrap you ask?

It's skeet and trap combined with a few little kicks. The kicks include shooting wobble trap from the skeet stations with the machine cranked up to an ungodly speed.

Shooters can take up to three rounds at each skeet station. Once you hit a bird at a station, count coup and you move on. After three missed birds at any one station, you are done for that station, and you have an "0 fer." When you've used up all your 25-round box of shells, you get to watch everyone else shoot and suffer the indignity of being a less than accurate shot and are in contention for one of the participation trophies —LOW GUN NO GUN Fish Award or LOW GUN NET Rubber Chicken award.

After participating in three events, shooters will establish their individual handicaps which is 90 percent of the difference between 25 and the last 3-5 scores. *Note:* Handicaps are set to weed out ringers.

You have opportunities to win money, trophies, and unending abuse and ridicule from your fellow shooters. Trophies are awarded for Hign Gun Gross, Champion Net, Runner Up Net, and Third Place net. Even the worst two shooters get participation trophies!

There is also an option for shooters to participate in the Money Bird pot which can be as much as \$100. The pot is set by the number of shooters who participate by tossing \$1 into the pot. The Money Bird is a uniquely painted clay that when broken showers the fall area with purple dust. See an example of a Money Bird below.

Join us for our almost monthly events on selected Wednesdays. Breakfast and registration start at 8:30 a.m. and shooting starts on Trap Field 3 as close to 9:30 as possible, considering it's like herding cats to get shooters off their laurels.

The "Bucky" Sills Winter Skeet and Trap League 2023 Season Award Winners

The 2023 season of the Winter Skeet and Trap League concluded on April 2nd with the final standings once again being determined during the very last matches of the season for both team and individual competition.

In the Individual Competition, our High Overall Average winner was John Allen, who broke 555 of 600 targets equating to a combined average of 23.125. Jim Hickerson took the honors for High Skeet average with an impressive 23.917 hitting 287 of 300 targets. Right behind him for Skeet Runner-up was John Murphy, with a 23.750 average. In Trap, the High average winner was Travis Rockwood, ending the season with an average of 23.500, hitting 282 of 300 targets. The runner-up for High Trap was Mike Gilbert, coming in with a 22.417 average. In the Most Improved category, Zach Butcher beat out several other contenders to capture the award with a combined average improvement from last season of 4.750 targets.

The team competition is based on the cumulative team scores over the entire season. The weekly team score is the sum of the highest four handicapped scores for each squad. Awards are made to the top ten teams. Captain Mike Whitmore led his Team 9 to a season score of 2,382.944 to lock down the 1st place award. Team 5 was close behind in the 2nd place slot with a score of 2,358.843 led by Captain Ashly Palles. Third place was won by Team 18 with a score of 2349.667 with Captain Gregg Hanson at the helm. Captain Brian Hickerson's Team 23 captured 4th place coming in with a score of 2,347.691. The 5th place finisher was Team 27 with a 2,347.483 with Captain Cash Miller. Rounding out the top ten were Team 21 led by Captain Mike Burlein in 6th place, Team 3 lead by Captain James Hsu in 7th place, Team 24 led by Captain Dave Myers in 8th place, Team 7 led by Captain Bill Leonard on 9th place, and Team 8 led by Captain Bruce Crandlemire in 10th place.

ARL-FX IWLA Cub Run Archers



For those Chapter members who are interested in competing in Virginia Bowhunters Association (VBA) archery events, the Chapter established a VBA group called Cub Run Archers so field archery tournaments could be held at

Limited Broadhead Use on Outdoor Range

The indoor and 3-D archery ranges are for **field tip use ONLY**, no broadheads are allowed on these ranges. The
outdoor archery range does provide broadhead targets,
but only on the target butts marked in bright **RED** stating
"BROADHEADS OK."

These target butts are located at the crossbow station and include 20-, 30-, and 40-yard Rienehart walls ($4' \times 4'$

black target butts). There are also 2' x 4' target butts with **RED** dots that may be used for broadheads, and the **RED** cube dice at 50 yards. In other words, if there is a **RED** "BROADHEADS OK" sign or **RED** dots on the block target butts, these may be used for broadheads. All other targets are for field tips only. This includes any 3-D targets that may be placed on the range.

All core-drilling broadheads are strictly prohibited on the Chapter archery ranges.

Damage to the target blocks and 3-D animals on the outdoor range has occurred in the recent weeks. There is evidence someone is shooting core-drilling broadheads. Anyone witnessing broadhead usage on these targets, please notify the Archery Range officer or any Cub Run officer.

As stated on the ARL-FX IWLA/Cub Run Archers Web site range rules (Section 11 PROHIBITIONS—https://www.cubrunarchers.org/range-rules.html):

"Anyone observed ... shooting broadhead-tipped arrows at other than targets expressly designed for that purpose will be referred to the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, IWLA, board of directors for disciplinary action" with a recommendation they purchase the damaged target.

Broadhead Rules

The Big Shot 41" Ironman target on the 60-yard target butt was destroyed sometime between August 28 and 31, 2022. We are unable to determine the broadhead type, but it totally destroyed the burlap cover. This \$500 target will now need to be replaced.

Just as a reminder, no core-drilling broadheads are allowed to be used on the Chapter archery ranges. This includes the Flying Arrows Archery Toxic and Cyclone broadheads.

If anyone has any information regarding this damage to the targets or knowledge of who is shooting core-drilling broadheads, please contact any Chapter officer.

When caught, this perpetrator will be brought before the Chapter board of directors and will face disciplinary action to include replacing the target.



Archery Qualifying for the Fairfax County Park Program

Archery qualifying is under way, Tuesday evenings 6 p.m. until 8 p.m. and Sunday mornings 9 a.m. until 12 noon. Qualifying will take place at the outdoor field archery range. No practice broadheads may be used for qualifying. Archers must have three arrows/bolts with broadheads to attempt to qualify. Qualifying will end on Sunday, June 25th. NOT Allowed on IWLA Archery Range

News Release from Department of Wildlife Resources (DWR) Regarding Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD)

Fairfax County, Prince William County, and Arlington County are being added to Disease Management Area 2 (DMA2) for the 2023-2024 deer hunting season.

Fawn rehabilitation and deer carcass transport restrictions go into effect May 1st. Whole deer carcasses and any parts containing brain and/or spinal cord tissues originating from Fairfax or Arlington Counties may only be transported to locations within Fairfax, Prince William, Arlington, Loudoun, Fauquier, Rappahannock, Culpeper, Page, Madison, Orange, Frederick, Warren, and Shenandoah Counties.

Air Range

High School Air Rifle Regional Championship

After a slate of very close regular season matches, the Potomac High School Rifle League (PHSRL) held a 3x20 precision air rifle regional championship on February 18th at the Sills Air Range. The winning regional team has their name engraved on the Bob Hardy Cup trophy, named for the long-time Robinson coach and PHSRL supporter who passed away in 2021. The league consists of ten local high school teams, plus the Mavericks team (for athletes whose school does not have a rifle program). This year 192 youth shooters participated in the league. Each team shot a seven-match regular season capped off by a day-long championship match for the top teams and athletes.

In a tightly contested fight for the team title, where the top three schools were separated by just 3 points out of 2,400 points, Woodson High School edged out West Springfield High School by a single point to take home the match championship. Woodson was represented by Rushil Punukollu, Ben Hays, Rachel Xu, Ella Derrick, and Hannah Lee.

Second place West Springfield was represented by Tess Hines, Olivia Rummler, Grace Corbett, Alex Sigurdson, and Kai Gagliano. Just two points behind that, Lake Braddock took third place with Robinson taking fourth place. Full results are available at https://www.orionresults.com/afciwla.

The overall individual winner of this year's championship was Tess Hines, a senior from West

Cub Run 2023 Clean Up

The Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., IWLA, began a partnership with the Cub Run Park Volunteer Team and the Fairfax County Park Authority in spring 2018 to clean up a portion of Cub Run Park that borders Chapter property on the north side of I-66. We have participated in clean-up events spring and fall each year since then, except 2020 when Covid restrictions resulted in cancellation of the events.

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
