How did you first learn about the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter? Perhaps a current member told you about the Chapter and all it has to offer. Or maybe a friend invited you to join them as their guest and you decided this was exactly the place where you wanted to spend some quality time. Perhaps you were drawn to the Chapter's exceptional archery and air rifle ranges, or your child joined one of the Chapter-sponsored Scout Troops and Packs. Maybe you loved breaking clays or shooting your firearms at the outdoor ranges.

For dozens of new members every year, their first introduction to the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter and its many activities occurs at the Nation's Gun Show, which is held seven weekends per year at the Dulles Expo Center in Chantilly.

The Arlington-Fairfax Chapter has maintained table space at the gun show for years and uses the enthusiasm and personal experiences of Chapter volunteers to provide information to interested show attendees who are attracted to the table.

Getting to Know the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter (Part 5)

Chapter Groups/Clubs

Welcome to the fifth installment of "Getting to know the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter." Although the Chapter ranges are usually what draws individuals to become members, there are also many different and interesting aspects of the Chapter to explore. This article will focus on several of the Chapter's organized groups/clubs. These groups/clubs are open to all members and brings together like-minded members who want to share their interests, skills, and knowledge with other members.

Angler's Club

Fishing has deep roots in the history of the Izaak Walton League of America. The organization was founded in 1922 by sportsmen to fight the pollution in Chicago's waters. They named their new organization after Izaak Walton, a 17th century English angler, and author of the literary classic, *The Compleat Angler*. If you fish, flyfish, or if you wish you could fish and would like to learn how and where to fish with fellow anglers, consider joining one of the newest groups to be established at the ARL-FX Chapter, the Angler's Club. This group was formed to promote the excitement and joys of fishing for anglers of all ages, skills, and experience levels, from novices learning to fish or tie a fly to seasoned anglers wishing to share and expand their

knowledge and skills. Other club activities include Chapter pond maintenance to ensure a healthy fish population. If you are interested in joining the Angler's Club, please contact Joe Arevalo at *joseph.arevalo@gmail.com*.

Knife Club

The Chapter's Knife Club is an energetic group of knife, axe, tomahawk, and multi-tool enthusiasts who enjoy sharing their passions for sharpened steel. The club meets periodically (mostly on a quarterly basis) at different locations around the Chapter's property and hosts such events as "favorite user" or collector blade "Show Offs"; Knife, Axe, and Tomahawk Carry; Safe-Use Workshops; and Scout Jamboree Knife/Hatchet Safety classes. Recently, the club has included workshops in skills that included fire-prep and starting, knife and axe sharpening and care classes, tomahawk throwing (at the club's throwing station), knife defensive training, and other survivalist-skill training. Service Rifle

The Chapter holds Service Rifle matches seven times a year on the second Thursday of every month from April through October. All participants must use a rifle that was used in any country's military at some time in history. Shoots occur in four stages, using a total of 50 rounds of the firearm's caliber. The stages are: Slow Fire, Sitting Rapid Fire, Prone Rapid Fire, and Prone Slow Fire. Shooters compete in four classes: Basic, Advanced, Experienced Iron Sights, and Experienced Optical Sights. Bullseye Pistol League

The Chapter holds Bullseye Pistol matches the morning of the first Sunday of the month, during the league's two seasons. Rimfire matches usually run March through August and centerfire matches are held from September through December. These matches are informal, friendly competitions with participants using a traditional, one-handed stance while target shooting at 25 yards. The course of fire consists of 20 shots in 20 minutes (slow fire), 20 shots at 4 seconds per shot (timed fire), and 20 shots at 2

seconds per shot (rapid fire). During the springtime rimfire competition, participants use a .22 LR caliber handgun. The fall competition participants are transitioned to centerfire-caliber handguns (.32 caliber or higher). If members don't have a centerfire handgun and would like to participate in the fall competitions, they can bring a .22LR pistol and the league organizers will try to find a spot for the member to shoot on the firing line. Bull Run Muzzleloaders

Bull Run Muzzleloaders (BRML) is a National Muzzle Loading Rifle Association (NMLRA) charter club and a proud member of the association's "1 in 1,000 Endowment Program." The club began in 1987 as an informal group of enthusiasts meeting in the morning of the third Sunday of every month to shoot muzzleloaders, socialize, and share their reloading and shooting experiences. The club grew steadily and in June 1988, BRML became a NMLRA Charter Club. Over three decades later, the BRML's shoots are still held at the riflepistol range of the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter on the third Sunday of each month. The rifle-pistol range is located close to the site of the First Battle of Bull Run, giving the club its name. BRML is open to all Chapter members and also open to the public. Members of the BRML will provide firearms and muzzle-loading and shooting instruction to curious attendees and the experienced members are happy to act as mentors to beginners who are interested in learning more about this unique shooting sport. Cub Run Archers

During the 1950s, the ARL-FX Chapter board of directors established the Cub Run Archers (CRA) to further the

sport of archery and promote and establish facilities for the enjoyment of this sport by the Chapter's membership. CRA membership also allows ARL-FX Chapter members to meet a key requirement for participation in official tournaments of the Virginia Bowhunters Association (VBA) and USA Archery, whose bylaws require membership in a VBA-affiliated archery club for individuals to compete in VBA-sanctioned archery matches. With these state and national affiliations, the Chapter is able to host sanctioned archery tournaments which have become very popular with members and nonmembers alike, and shooting lines often fill up well before the tournaments begin. While archers of all skill levels are encouraged to join the CRA, a prerequisite to joining CRA is membership in the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, IWLA. https://cubrunarchers.org/index.html

The Chapter's continued growth and success is built on each member's participation in and support of various activities of interest. As my previous newsletter columns have demonstrated, there are many different ways for Chapter members to engage in organized activities and programs, either individually or with other Chapter members. The initial questions by visitors are almost always the same: "Where is the Chapter located? How long is the shooting range? How much does it cost to join?" Many times the initial questions are followed by the most important question a potential member can ask: "How do I join?"

When someone who knew little to nothing about the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter is considering membership after a brief conversation, the Chapter's volunteer has succeeded.

With the closing of Elite Shooting to the public, many former members who stopped at the information table last year find the Chapter's location, facilities, and membership fee to be a great replacement option.

Having phenomenal field and target archery ranges only adds to the interest of hunters and recreational archers, alike. The air rifle range, Scout activities, campground, and fishing pond are especially attractive to those who have children.

One of the more interesting comments heard at the Chapter's information table is from those who either live near, or regularly drive past, the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter property.

When they learn exactly where the Chapter is located, they express surprise because they "never knew it existed." Instead, they almost universally link the sounds from firearms to shooting activities at the Bull Run Shooting Center. One nearby neighbor admitted while he always wondered where all the shooting was coming from, it is so regular he never was concerned enough to call the police.

Other visitors to the Chapter information table include newer firearm owners who want to learn how to safely handle and shoot firearms. This offers the Chapter volunteers an opportunity to explain the NRA training courses offered through the Chapter's Education & Training (E&T) Program and handout a brochure to the visitor. And while one does not have to be a Chapter member to take an E&T class, having nonmembers visit the Chapter for a class is yet another opportunity for them to consider membership after they see the great facilities.

But the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter's information table does more than promote an individual chapter of the Izaak Walton League of America. Because the Nation's Gun Show regularly attracts attendees from Maryland and West



Virginia, the Chapter volunteers also provide information and literature about the National IWLA and local chapters in those states, as well as providing attendees from more distant locations in Virginia with information on their local chapters.

Besides helping people who might benefit from receiving firsthand information about the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, members who volunteer at the Chapter's gun show table enjoy free admission to the Nation's Gun Show and can spend their morning or afternoon

visiting the show's vendors and exhibits.

Members interested in volunteering at the Chapter table during one of the numerous gun shows held every year in Chantilly can schedule themselves using SignUpGenius. Volunteers must be familiar with the Chapter's facilities and the membership process. While this does not mean a volunteer must be intimately knowledgeable, it does require a basic and solid understanding of the Chapter. If a member is interested in volunteering at the gun show information table but is uncertain if they know enough about the Chapter to participate, they can send a note via the "contact" link at the top of the qun show table's SignUpGenius page. As a general rule, if a member has been in the Chapter for at least a year, they usually know enough to participate. In addition, new table volunteers can be paired with experienced table volunteers. If a member has less than one year of membership in the Chapter, they should first send a note from the SignUpGenius table volunteer sign-up page to see if they are eligible to volunteer.

Volunteering at the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter's information table at the Nation's Gun Show is a fun way to spend a few hours and introduce members of the public to the Chapter and to the Izaak Walton League of America. Volunteers also create a very important presence for the Chapter at a key recruiting event. Chapter volunteers set the table up in advance and stock it with brochures, magazines, photos, and other information for volunteers to hand out. Find a few hours this year to volunteer at the Nation's Gun Show and share your enthusiasm about the Chapter with a future member. They will thank you.



2024 Scholarship

In 1993, the board of directors of the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter of the Izaak Walton League of America established its environmental sciences scholarship as a means of demonstrating the Chapter's concern for the environment and for the young people of the tri-county (Arlington, Fairfax, and Prince William) area. The scholarship is for a total of 4 years at a value of \$5,000 per year paid directly to the applicant's institution of higher learning in support of their degree in environmental sciences or a related field. The Scholarship Committee of the Chapter reviews the applications submitted each April and makes its recommendation to the board of directors on the basis of the applicant's academic achievement, financial need, environmental activities and achievements, and the individual character of the applicant.

Scholarship News

As a means of tangibly displaying the concern of our Chapter for both the environment and the young people of this area, the Chapter will be awarding its 2024 Environmental Studies Scholarship this coming spring. The scholarship will be awarded to a local area high-school graduate. The total amount of the scholarship will be \$20,000 and will be paid in four annual installments to the recipient's college of choice. Applications will be accepted

from high-school seniors who are currently enrolled in Fairfax County, Fairfax City, Arlington County, Manassas, Manassas Park, or Prince William County schools (either public or private). The applicant must graduate this coming spring and plan on majoring in environmental sciences or a related field of study. The recipient of the scholarship will be selected by the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter's Scholarship Committee. The committee will review the applications submitted and make their decision based on several factors including academic achievement, financial need, environmental activities and achievements, and the individual character of the applicant. Interested seniors can access the application from the Chapter's Web site (www.arlingtonfairfax-iwla.org). Scholarship information will be mailed to all local schools in January. They may also request a copy of the application directly by writing to Scholarship Committee, Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., P.O. Box 366, Centreville, VA 20122-0366 or by calling the Chapter at 703-631-4495 and leaving their name and address on the voice mail. Limited Broadhead Use on Outdoor Range

The indoor and 3-D archery ranges are for **field tip use ONLY**, no broadheads are allowed on these ranges. The
outdoor archery range does provide broadhead targets,
but only on the target butts marked in bright **RED** stating
"BROADHEADS OK."

These target butts are located at the crossbow station and include 20-, 30-, and 40-yard Rienehart walls (4' x 4' black target butts). There are also 2' x 4' target butts with **RED dots** that may be used for broadheads, and the **RED** cube dice at 50 yards. In other words, if there is a **RED** "BROADHEADS OK" sign or **RED dots** on the block target butts, these may be used for broadheads. *All other targets are for field tips only*. This includes any 3-D targets that may be placed on the range.

All core-drilling broadheads are strictly prohibited on the Chapter archery ranges.

Field Archery—Guest Liability Release Statement Form

At the outdoor archery sign-in station and at the indoor archery range sign-in desk, there are Guest Liability Release Statement Forms that need to be completed. Members are responsible for completing a Guest Release Statement Form before starting to shoot on any of the field archery ranges, when bringing a guest. There is a daily \$10 Guest Fee. Fill out the form, placing money or check inside the folded release form, and place it into the drop box.

Deer Processing Station

For Chapter deer hunters who would like to process their deer, the deer processing station is twenty yards off the Field Archery deck. The area is lighted and has running water from a garden hose located by the deck entrance. You will need to bring trash bags with you for proper disposal of all parts of the carcass. When finished be sure to wash the area down completely, putting all remains in plastic bags before placing them into any dumpster. During cold weather, when finished be sure to drain the hose of water to keep it from freezing. Please leave the area cleaner than you found it.

Restricted Transporting of Deer Carcass

Whole deer carcasses and any parts containing brain and/ or spinal cord tissues originating from Fairfax, Prince William, or Arlington Counties may only be transported to locations within DMA2 and DMA1 which includes Fairfax, Loudoun, Fauquier, Rappahannock, Culpeper, Orange, Clark, Page, Madison, Frederick, and Warren Counties.

Archery 201 Classes

The Archery 201 classes are held at the indoor archery range. These sessions are held on five consecutive Sunday nights. There are two age groups, Youth ages 9-13 years old (5:30 p.m.-6:30 p.m.) and Adult 13 years old and up (7 p.m.-8 p.m.) with a maximum of 11 students in each group. All archery equipment is provided so there is not any initial expense to participate. We also encourage the use of personal equipment if the student has already purchased it. The class is taught using the USA Archery 11-step instruction model. We first concentrate on shooting form. Then we build upon this foundation with each lesson, so the student has the total archery shooting package by the end of the session. Safety and range rules are taught the first night

and reviewed before each class along with warm-ups and stretching. The class will cover the different types of archery equipment used, archery safety, purchasing of equipment, and live shooting. We try to have a 1:3 coach to student ratio so the student gets the best coaching we can provide.

Junior Olympic Archery Development Archers Finish Their Year with New Range Records

On a cool, clear November weekend, 20 members of the ARL-FX Chapter Junior Olympic Archery Development (JOAD) team headed to the Chapter Indoor Archery Facility to participate in the ARL-FX Chapter Indoor Archery Tournament.

Some of the JOAD archers had competed in various tournaments since they started the JOAD program, while others were participating in their very first competition that day. Five gold, seven silver, and one bronze medal were awarded to the ARL-FX Chapter JOAD team, in addition to setting two new Chapter Indoor Archery Facility records.

"It was an extremely fun tournament to watch, as all of our youth shot so well," Coach Jeff Del Vecchio said. "It was amazing to watch how kind and supportive they were to each other. I'm looking forward to watching them all grow into amazing archers." All the youth got their start in archery tournaments by participating in the ARL-FX Chapter JOAD program, led by ARL-FX Chapter volunteer archery coaches.

"We suggested that the youth in the JOAD program give a local tournament a try. Although some were nervous about it, many decided afterwards that it was fun," Jeff said. "The youth progressed quickly due to excellent coaching and their own efforts. It is a great sport for kids. Coaches Jonathan Fisher, Dave Grant, and Kevin Flynn are amazing!"

Pin Shoots during the 12-week JOAD program simulate a tournament environment and reward an archer's progress and development. The "pin" is a reward earned when an archer shoots the required score at their designated distance to get the corresponding achievement. More than one pin was awarded during the tournament as personal bests were achieved.

Archers shoot 30 for indoor pins. The indoor distance is 18 meters — but the targets are either 40 cm or 60 cm in diameter, depending on the archer's age. Each arrow shot earns a value between 0 and 10, depending on where it hits the target. The archer gets a pin if they meet the cumulative score designated to get the next colored pin after shooting all 30 arrows.

"Archery is very relaxing because the youth get to be out of the house and focus on only themselves and their target," Jeff said. "I like to see their improvement by shooting higher scores and earning pins." In 2024, the ARL-FX Chapter JOAD Team is planning to compete nationally at tournaments like the USA Archery Nationals at Harrisonburg, Virginia, in February.

and skills to improving the facilities of the Skeet and Trap Range that is the gem of the Chapter.

The crowning glories of the initiative were the complete reconstructions of two shotgun patterning boards from scratch. After weathering years of heavy use, the old boards sorely needed replacing. I led my troop of over twelve volunteers through long days of cutting fresh planks, carefully measuring and reassembling the frames,

Eagle Scout Project — Kiernan El-Hage

My name is Kiernan El-Hage, and I am a junior at Centreville High School. This year I completed my Eagle Scout project and Messenger of Peace Ambassador award here at the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., Izaak Walton League of America. My project entailed removing invasive plants during the annual Sully District Twilight Camp held here at the Chapter. This is a week-long camp where Cub Scouts from all over the area can enjoy outdoor Scouting activities such as fishing, nature, Scoutcraft, shooting, and much more without leaving our local area. My project took place in the nature activity portion of the camp.

The project was broken up into three parts over the course of seven days. The first day was one of two prep days to prepare the project area for Twilight Camp. BSA Scouts and adults worked together to remove a vast population of Autumn Olive trees. First, I instructed them on what Autumn Olive is, the correct way to remove them, and the safety involved. The second day was another prep day. This time I instructed BSA Scouts to help mark off the areas where I wanted the Cub Scouts to remove the invasive species. We also marked off "No Go Zones," which were areas unsafe for the Cubs to go in.

Following the last prep day was the start of Twilight Camp. Cub Scouts from all around Sully District (Centreville, Clifton, and Chantilly) were broken up into six dens that rotate through the different stations. With each den that came through my team of BSA Scouts and I taught them



about invasive species, the hazards, proper safety precautions, and what they would be doing during my project. After that, I instructed BSA Scouts to hand out materials they would need to remove the invasive

plants and to show them their assigned section of the project area. To make this more engaging, I created a competition between all the dens to see who could fill up the most bags in the shortest amount of time. At the end of each session, we gave each Scout a bookmark which included a QR code to more facts on invasive species, pictures of the invasive species they helped remove, and a place where they could track their time and how many bags they filled. This served as a keepsake and hopefully a tool for Scouts to use in the future. Toward the end of the camp, I awarded the winning den with candy and a certificate to commemorate their hard work.

In total, we removed 134 Autumn Olive trees and had 57 full bags of invasive plants. There were 125 participants with a total of 272 volunteer hours. In addition to this, my project also made 33 BSA Scouts eligible to earn their Messenger of Peace award.

and nailing each piece into place. It was deeply rewarding to rebuild a piece of the grounds that hold so much value to the members of the Chapter.

As much as the Eagle Scout project is about delegation, it is just as much about teamwork. Together, my Scouts and I got to practice all those woodworking, building, and planning skills Scouting has taught us over the years—the perfect culmination of our journey so far.

In addition to repairing infrastructure, my troop and I cleaned up the multiple ranges over that weekend,

restocking thrower houses with fresh clays, filling up target launchers, and improving the landscape.

The Scouts had a blast working hard and hanging out together at their "home base."

As I reflect on the experience, I'm filled with pride in my troop and gratitude for the place that let me discover my passions. I hope our work allows future generations of Scouts to thrive on these grounds, forming the same bonds and learning the same lessons that shaped us. Our shared effort was the ultimate representation of values like service, leadership, and community that I'll carry with me long after I age out.
