Another Olympian from our Chapter heads to RIO

Robinson High School graduate Lucas Kozeniesky, presently a junior at NC State University, is heading to the 2016 Rio Olympic Games after a brilliant performance winning the U.S. Olympic Trials in men's air rifle. Lucas got his start shooting air rifle at the little red range at our Chapter. He shot at AFC-IWLA for four

years as part of his high school shooting career. He was a member of the Robinson Rifle Teams 2009-2013(three years as the Robinson Captain) before going on to compete in college. During these years Lucas led Robinson team to several National High School Championships conducted by the NRA and USA Shooting Team. Lucas is a rising senior, and the leading shooter at NC State University where he won NCAA All-American honors during the recent college season and is the first NC State student to shoot in the Olympics.

He'll be joining Ginny Thrasher in Rio with both shooters being products of our AFC-IWLA youth shooting programs. Both Olympians recently competed at the 2016 USA Shooting National Championships at Ft Benning, where Lucas won the Men's Three

Position Air Rifle National Championship and Ginny won the Women's Air Rifle National Championship. While the Rio shooting event qualifications won't be televised, all finals will be on TV and available via live streaming.

Next fall he will be joined by three Robinson team mates on the NC State Team--Caitlyn Ford (Jr.), Claire Spina, (Soph), and recent graduate, Zach Eisenberg, (Freshman). All who got their start at the little red range at our Chapter.

Presidents Column

The next time you're walking around the Chapter property, take a look at some of the improvements underway. At Skeet & Trap (S&T), new and improved walkways have been laid, and a lot of releveling of the areas around the walkways has been accomplished. The walkways in front of the S&T fieldhouse have been specially widened to be wheelchair accessible, and all of the walkways are now well above the ground level. All of this will help ensure water and, depending on the time of year, snow and ice on the walkways won't be a problem for our shooters.

The way the new walkways project was handled is a good example of how we like to do things at Arlington-Fairfax. The original estimates to do all four fields were all around \$30,000.00. Bob Brino, the Designated Director for Skeet & Trap, found a chapter member who owns a company capable of handling the job, and who offered to do the job at cost. Thanks to the member's generosity, and a bit of volunteer work by other members, that meant the job would cost \$20,000.00, rather than the \$30,000.00 originally estimated.

The Board of Directors approved the project. Then, Bob asked the chapter members who are regulars at S&T to donate money to help defray the cost of the new walkways. And the membership responded in a BIG way. At last count, nearly \$18,000.00 was donated by the membership to help pay for the new walkways; and money is still coming in. Thanks to the generosity of our membership, and the outstanding service by the one member whose company did the work, the cost to the Chapter will be no more than \$2,000; for a job originally estimated at

\$30,000.00! That's quite a testimonial to the Chapter's management and its great membership.

There are several ongoing projects at the Air Rifle and Air Pistol Range. Roger Thrasher, the Range Manager, has assembled an energetic group of volunteers who are doing great service to the Chapter and the folks who utilize the range.

At Field Archery, the same is true. Several ongoing projects are leveraging volunteer effort to address necessary maintenance and safety issues, and to improve the overall facility. And again, these projects are being done for a small fraction of what they would cost without the volunteers managing the projects.

Look around the chapter as you drive or walk through. You'll notice the wooded areas look a lot nicer thanks to the work of John Seaberg, and a small group of volunteers, who have cleared a tremendous amount of underbrush and fallen trees. Fallen or cut trees are cut into firewood which we sell; and the underbrush is turned into mulch. Look along Mount Olive Road and Compton Road as you drive to the chapter. It looks nice, doesn't it? That's because Jim Pont and his volunteers are out picking up the trash along the roads on a regular basis. I hope you have noticed how nice the Chapter Field House looks lately. That's because Ed Forsberg and a small group of volunteers work several times a week to keep it that way.

Yes; there are a lot of improvements being made. Now think about what we could accomplish with YOUR help.

Cub Run Archers would like to extend a warm welcome and an invitation to all members of the IWLA to take advantage of the many facilities, training opportunities, archery equipment, events and great camaraderie that our club has to offer. Our state of the art indoor range is available for your use anytime a qualified Range Officer is on site. It is common knowledge that a good many regulars in the club are at the range house every morning from approximately 9:30am until noon.

This is a great time to come down and introduce yourself and find out what Cub Run Archers is all about. If you are new to archery and need advice on anything from bow setup, arrow tuning to shooting technique, not only will you find literally, several hundred years of collective experience, but the equipment to perform those tasks. We especially would like to encourage youth participation and have a great many youth bows that young shooters may practice with to develop their skills.

The cost to join Cub Run Archers is only \$15.00 per year, per family. Though you don't need to be a member of Cub Run Archers to use the facilities, we have a monthly newsletter and several dinners and picnics

throughout the year and attendance at even one of these would easily be worth the annual membership.

The outdoor archery facilities are available to any member in good standing of the IWLA. We have practice range with target butts at 5, 10, 15, 20, 30, 40, 50, and 60 yards. The range is lighted for shooting after dark. There is crossbow station with a bag target for field point shooting and a broadhead targets for shooting broadheads. **Remember,** crossbows are allowed, **Only To Be Shot From The Crossbow Station** and not at any of the other targets or ranges. A 28 point field archery course is also available for use to all IWLA members. Daytime use only as there is no lighting on the course.

Shooting Reminder

Only Shoot Broadheads Into A Broadhead Target Butts! If you do not know the difference between the two kinds of target butts on the range please ask someone at the range before you start shooting. The target butts cost IWLA members \$250 each. Help us get the most life out of each target butt as possible. No Core Drilling Broaheads Are Permitted To Be Shot At The Field Archery Range. These are the TOXIC AND THE CYCLONE and any new core drilling broadheads that comes on the market.

Deer Processing Station

For all the IWLA deer hunters who would like to process their own deer, the deer processing station is twenty yards off the Field Archery Deck. The area is lighted with running water from a garden hose located by the deck entrance. You will need to bring

trash bags with you for proper disposal of all parts of the carcass. When finished be sure to wash the area down completely putting all remains in plastic bags before going into any dumpster. During cold weather when finished be sure to drain the hose of water to keep it from freezing.

Archery 101 Session

On Sunday September 25th and Sunday October 23th Cub Run Archers will be hosting a beginner's archery class. The class will take place in the indoor archery range starting at 1:00pm till 4:00pm. The class is for those who have never shot archery before or have very little knowledge in the sport of archery. The class will cover the different types of archery equipment, safety, purchasing of equipment, and shooting. We have the bows and arrows.....all you need to do is show up. For IWLA members the class is \$20.00 for adults and \$10.00 for children with a max of \$30.00 per IWLA family. Non IWLA members the class is \$25.00 per adult and \$15.00 for children with a family max of \$40.00. Class Fees will be collected before the start of the class beginning at 12.45pm. Nonetheless, we appreciate your patience in receiving your new credentials. It can take up to 4-6 weeks once your payment has cleared your bank to receive your new credentials.

If you are a new member who joined the Chapter in 2016 and have not completed your required 6 hours of volunteer work, you will not receive your Range Sticker with your new membership card. Once you have completed the six hours of volunteer work, you will then receive your permanent Range Badge and range sticker. Unfortunately we can't mail Permanent Range Badges since they get crushed by the Postal System. You'll have to visit the Membership Office in the Chapter Field House any Tuesday from 1-4 p.m. or 1-9 p.m. on the first and third Tuesday of the month to pick up your badge and insert.

Dear Mr. Dobbins,

I hope this e-mail finds you well. I am writing because I would like to express my deepest gratitude to you, the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter of the Izaac Walton League (AFIWLA), and the Board of Directors of AFIWLA for helping me achieve my goals and the American Dream in the United States. As you know, I was the fortunate recipient of the AFIWLA Scholarship in 2005. As the son of immigrant parents of very modest means, having the economic support of the AFIWLA was instrumental in terms of achieving my goal of becoming the first person in my family to obtain a college degree. In 2009, I accomplished that goal after four years of unrelenting economic support from AFIWLA. For that, I will always be grateful. I would also like to take this opportunity to fill you in on what has happened in my life since obtaining my Bachelor's Degree from the University of Virginia. In 2014, I received a law degree from American University and was admitted to the New York State Bar shortly thereafter (I have attached a picture of my oath ceremony). I worked in New York City for two years providing *pro bono* legal representation to survivors of domestic violence. Needless to say, being able to help such a vulnerable group of people was fulfilling and gratifying for professional and personal reasons. I am now back in the Washington D.C. area. Three weeks ago, I started a new job at the Department of Labor, where I am part of a legal team that advocates for the well -being of workers in our country. I am very fortunate to have the opportunity to use my career



to help people and, in the process, make this country a better place for us all. This, to me, is what the American Dream is all about -- achieving your professional potential and using your skills to make our country a better place for everyone and for future generations. I could not have gotten here without you and the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter of the Izaac Walton League. Thank you for believing in me and for giving me the opportunity to achieve the American Dream. I will always be thankful.

A sold out crowd of 135 shooters participated in the 18th Annual Crush'n Clays on June 11th 2016 at the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter of the IWLA in Centreville, Virginia. Over the last 18 years Crush'n Clays has raised \$325,000. Crush'n Clays is not only, the longest running shooting charity that supports the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, but also, it is the



longest consecutive running shooting charity event in the country.

Participants were provided with ammunition, event t-shirts and lunch. The trap shooting event consisted of 25 targets from the 16 yard line and 25 targets from the 22 yard-

line. Both individuals and four person teams competed in the event. In the team competition the best three scores on each squad counted for the team score. All participants were eligible for individual awards using a "Lewis" class system.

The festivities began with Bob Brino, Skeet/Trap Director of the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter of the IWLA, providing a shotgun clinic for novice competitors. Once again, Bob donated the targets for the event. We all owe Bob a big thanks.

Again this year, we welcomed Suburban Electric as a sponsor. Jim Hickerson, owner of Suburban Electric, is an Arlington-Fairfax IWLA member, shoots in the winter shotgun league, and is an accomplished skeet shooter. A big shout out to Jim, one of our own, for his support of Crush'n Clays.

As always, the Annie Oakley drew a huge number of participants. Many participants entered the event multiple times resulting in with well over 200 entries during the day. The Annie Oakley event also had tremendous spectator appeal, pitting the skills of one shooter against another. Information on Renewing your Membership for 2017

FAQ'S GENERAL INFORMATION:

Please do **NOT** tape or staple forms, work sheets, and/or checks together.

The bottom portion of the Renewal Form is <u>vour receipt</u> for the tax deductible portion of your dues. If you don't detach and keep it, we will not keep it or mail it back to you.

If you need to make payments, <u>you</u> must bring the request before the Board of Director <u>BY the BOD meeting</u> <u>on the 5th of December, 2016</u>. That requirement is in the Bylaws.

If you have not received your new membership card and range sticker within 6-8 weeks of sending your completed renewal forms with full payment (after your check has cleared the bank) – Email or Contact the Office at 703-631-4495. Don't wait months before contacting us.

The current credentials and gate code will be honored until the 1st of February.

IMPORTANT DATES:

DUE DATES - Completed renewal applications with payment are **DUE** by **January 1, 2017**. **LATE RENEWAL** – Late renewals are any renewal postmarked after January 1, 2017. Late Renewal postmarked after 1/1/17 **will not guarantee** you a membership slot for 2017. **There is a \$40 Late Processing fee after 1/1/17**.

Your renewal forms will be mailed out in your August and November newsletters (as a distinctively colored insert). You will **NOT** receive any separate mailings or reminder notice that renewals are due.

If you download or make a copy of the renewal form, please print it double sided.

Fill in <u>ALL</u> of the blanks completely. All of the information must be <u>PRINTED</u> and <u>LEGIBLE</u>. Clearly indicate any <u>CHANGES</u> from last year. If the form is missing critical information (like your current address) or we <u>CAN'T</u> read it, we will <u>NOT</u> process your renewal application but we will send it back to you to be corrected. (You can use a return address label for the name and address section if it is correct.)

Make sure the <u>Release Statement</u> on the back of the form is <u>signed</u> (must be signed by both primary and secondary member if Family membership). If the release is not signed, we will <u>NOT</u> process your renewal application but will send it back to you to be corrected.

MEMBERSHIP TYPES and CATEGORIES:

AMOUNT TO PAY – It is up to you to pay attention to the amount you should pay. If you have any questions, contact us to get the correct amount. If you pay too much, we will assume that the additional amount is meant as a donation.

SENIOR (S) – The <u>Senior</u> rate applies to anyone who reaches the age of 60 on or before December 31, 2016. (If you do not provide a DOB, you will NOT be considered eligible for a Senior discount). It is up to you to pay attention to the amount you should pay. If you pay too much, we will assume that the additional amount is meant as a donation.

REMOTE (R) - The <u>Remote</u> rate applies to anyone whose residence is more than 50 miles from the Chapter (measured as the "crow flies" not by how many miles you have to drive to get here).

LIFE (LF) - Life Memberships are only obtained from IWLA National. You must contact National to apply/pay for a Life Membership. Our Chapter does **NOT** have a Life Membership category but we honor National Life Membership with special renewal rates.

WORK CREDITS:

8-Hour Work Credit - If you have worked your extra Eight (8) hours of volunteer work and want credit for your \$50 discount, you must include your signed 8 hour work slip record with your renewal paperwork. If you do **NOT** include it or it is not signed, we will **NOT** process your renewal application but will send it back to be corrected.

FOR NEW MEMBERS ONLY - If you have **NOT** completed your six hours of volunteer work, you will **NOT** receive your Range Sticker with your new membership card. Once you have completed the six hours of volunteer work, and bring your temporary Range Badge, you will then receive your permanent Range Badge and range sticker (We do **NOT** mail Permanent Range Badges – They get crushed in our Postal System).
