

Conservation Updates from National IWLA

Ikes traveling to Iowa in July for the IWLA Convention will find a state at the center of American agriculture. Iowa ranks #1 in the production of corn, soybeans, eggs, and pork, and farmland covers about 90% of the Hawkeye state.

Iowa farms are also a leading contributor of nutrient pollution in the Mississippi River that ends up in the Gulf of Mexico, where the hypoxia "dead zone" was smaller in 2018 than in 2017, but still about the size of Delaware. Iowa is one of many states trying to reduce polluted runoff from farms and livestock operations into its rivers and lakes.

The new Farm Bill, signed into law in December, can help farmers in Iowa, Virginia, and other states be better stewards of their land and water. The new law provides about \$6 billion per year over the next five years for Farm Bill conservation programs, including funds that can help farmers plant buffer strips along streams, adopt nutrient management plans, and rebuild healthy soils.

Congress increased funding for the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program, which protects wetlands, native prairie, and other farmland by funding the purchase of conservation easements. The new law will also increase the Conservation Reserve Program to 27 million acres, which should allow more farmers to install buffer strips to protect streams and wetlands.

The new law will put a new emphasis on restoring healthy soils, which soak up rainfall like a sponge, reducing runoff of pesticides, fertilizer, and manure. The Farm Bill includes a soil health demonstration program to show farmers how to restore healthy soils, and it includes provisions to support soil health planning on farms and ranches.

The new Farm Bill also shifts funds to the Regional Conservation Partnership Program, which is designed to focus conservation dollars in high-priority regions, including the efforts to reduce nutrient runoff that ends up in the Chesapeake Bay and Gulf of Mexico. These many new opportunities to better use existing conservation funds are a key reason the Izaak Walton League supported passage of the new Farm Bill. Reps. Tom Garrett and Dave Brat were the only two members of the Virginia Congressional delegation to vote against the final Farm Bill.

Requested—Revisions to Range Rules for Air Range

Purpose & Rationale: To update and clarify existing Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., IWLA Air Range Rules. This will be voted on by the membership at the May 2019, general membership meeting. (Approved by the BOD at the March 6, 2019, meeting.) Revisions are in **Bold Italic**.

Revisions to Air Range Rules

May 2019

Air Range Rules Section I

Access to the Air Range

- 1. CONDUCT. Each person entering the Air Range is obligated to act in a safe and responsible manner. Parents are responsible for the conduct of their minor children. The Air Range is defined as the Air Range building and the surrounding walkways and patios. The firing area is defined as the 26-lane room inside the internal double doors where active firing takes place.
- 2. RANGE USAGE. The Air Range is open to Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., Izaak Walton League of America (ARL-FX IWLA) members and Youth members as outlined in the by-laws. All members using the Air Range will sign in on the log book and comply with any instructions on lane assignments or lane time limits.
- 3. GUESTS AND GENERAL PUBLIC. ARL-FX IWLA Chapter members may bring guests to the range during any open session. In order to provide outreach and promote the shooting sports, members of the general public may also use the range during announced open sessions (typically Monday and Friday evenings). The first five visits are complimentary. All individuals using the Air Range will sign in on the log book and comply with any instructions on lane assignments or lane time limits. First-time visitors must complete the Air Range Safety and Introduction Briefing and sign the release form located in the log book. Shooting athletes currently on NCAA teams, college club teams, or the USA Shooting National Team are welcome to occasionally shoot at the Air Range (on a complimentary basis).
- 4. RANGE SAFE PERSONS. Unless directly escorted by an Air Range volunteer, all ARL-FX IWLA members, guests, and visitors must complete the Air Range Safety and

- Introduction Briefing before entering the firing area. At that point individuals are considered to be range safe subject to restrictions in the range safety rules.
- 5. SUPPLIES AND EQUIPMENT. Supplies include compressed air, pellets, and targets. Equipment includes air guns, prone mats, stands, jackets, and other shooting gear. As an outreach program, the ARL-FX IWLA will provide complimentary supplies and equipment (as available) to ARL-FX IWLA members and shooters from the general public duringduring the Monday/Friday open sessions for up to five visits. Anyone wishing to continue to shoot after five visits is expected to pay the air range consumable fee, which defrays the cost of target cards, paper rolls, pellets, compressed air, etc. This is equivalent to paying for targets, ammunition, or sporting clays at other ranges.
- 6. YOUTH SHOOTING. A primary aim of the Air Range is to promote local youth shooting and youth shooting sports. This includes acting as one of the main ranges for the Potomac High School Rifle League (PHSRL) both in-season and out-of-season. PHSRL athletes on teams who have practice or home match slots at the air range must pay the yearly consumables fee.
- 7. MEMBERSHIP CARDS OR FEES PAYMENT TOKENS.
 Chapter members must present their membership cards and/or air range fees payment token upon request.
 Non-members must show their fees payment token upon request (after the five complimentary visits).
- 7. RANGE SCHEDULE. All Air Range use must be scheduled with the Air Range Director. No unsanctioned individual practices or unscheduled shooting is allowed. The complete air range schedule is posted on a dynamic internet calendar available on the Air Range Website. Select events will be published in the ARL-FX IWLA newsletter and in the online ARL-FX IWLA calendar. The range may be reserved

- and/or rented for approved **ARL-FX IWLA** matches, **Youth** shooting activities, or externally sponsored matches. **Reservations for** sponsored **teams and for ARL-FX IWLA sponsored or co-sponsored** matches are scheduled through the Air Range Director. External **range** usage is first tentatively scheduled with the Air Range Director, then the sponsoring group must accomplish the Facilities Use Request process outlined on the **ARL-FX IWLA** Website (**http://www.arlingtonfairfax-iwla.org**).
- 8. RANGE ACCESS. Approved range officers and coaches will receive time-coded access to the air range using an electronic lock system. Codes will be reset periodically. Approved range officers and coaches will also be given combo access to the gun safe and statistics office.

Section II

Range Safety

- 1. RANGE SAFETY OFFICERS. The Air Range Director will develop procedures to appoint and certify Range Safety Officers (RSOs) to operate the range during open practices and public events. RSOs must be over the age of 21 and must be an ARL-FX IWLA member. RSOs are responsible for safe and efficient operation of the Air Range and have wide discretion to ensure such operation. Decisions of the RSO must be complied with immediately. RSO's must be familiar with all air range rules and procedures.
- 2. RANGE ASSISTANTS. To assist the RSO in ensuring safe and efficient range operations, non-shooting adults at least 18 years of age may serve as a Range Assistant (RA) following a short training session given by an RSO. The RA is a non-coaching individual who assists the RSO in ensuring safe and efficient range operations. RA's must be familiar with all Air Range rules and procedures.
- 3. COACHES. The Air Range Director will develop procedures to appoint and orient coaches, to include USA Shooting certified training center (CTC) coaches and other coaches. Individuals 18 years of age who are registered NRA Level 1 (L1) or above Coaches may coach range. NRA registered junior trainers less than 18 years of age may coach under the supervision of an approved adult CTC coach. Coaches must be familiar with all Air Range rules and procedures.

- 4. GENERAL SAFETY. Unless directly escorted by an air range volunteer, all members, guests, and visitors must *complete* the *Air Range* Safety and Introduction Briefing **before** entering the **firing** area. This includes shooters and non-shooters. **Use of eye protection is** mandatory unless modified by the Air Range Director under the Special Events rules below. Use of Clear Barrel Indicators (CBIs) is mandatory when the range is cold or anytime a shooter steps away from their air gun. All individuals must obey instructions from the RSO, coaches, and RA's. Depending on the number and skill level of the shooters, the RSO will determine the proper ratio of *coaches* or RAs to shooters. If the RSO determines there is an unsafe ratio, they have complete discretion to limit the number of shooters on the line until more *coaches* or RAs arrive.
- 5. YOUNG AND/OR INEXPERIENCED SHOOTERS.
 - An NRA certified coach direct supervision while shooting, along with a sponsoring adult present on the range. Direct supervision may also be required for inexperienced or immature shooters over the age of 8 based on RSO or coach discretion. If no coach is available to provide sufficient direct supervision, prospective shooters must wait until a Coach is available. Coaches may refuse to coach any prospective shooter who they feel is not capable of safe shooting. The RSO may ask an unsafe patron to leave the firing area or deny entry to the firing area for any prospective patron who they feel is not capable of safe shooting or observing.
- 6. YOUTH PROTECTION AND SAFE SPORT. Two-deep adult coverage is required at all times. This means that two adults, one of whom must be 21 years of age or older, are required any time youth are in the range. One-on-one contact between adults and non-family youth under the age of 18 is prohibited. Junior shooters are not permitted in the range if a RSO is not on duty.
- 7. ALLOWABLE AIR GUNS. The range is designed to support target shooting for standard .177 caliber air guns. As such, higher caliber air guns and BB guns are not permitted. Only diabolo (wasp-waisted) lead pellets with a wadcutter (flat) front are to be used. Pellets must be less than 10 grains in weight. In addition, air guns must shoot at a velocity less than 650 ft/sec. Standard competition air guns complying with International Shooting Sports Federation (ISSF)

rules meet this velocity requirement. If questioned by the **RSO**, the responsibility lies with the shooter to demonstrate that the equipment in question complies with the requirements.

- 8. LANE USAGE. Shooters arriving on the line will ask the RSO for a lane assignment. The RSO may group types of shooters as required, such as putting experienced shooters in one area and new shooters in another area. Each individual firing position is reserved for the shooter, their actively used equipment, and a folding chair (optional). The yellow-lined walkway is for use of the RSO, transiting patrons, coaches, and RAs, so it must be kept clear of equipment. Shooting bags and cases may be placed behind the yellow-lined walkway in the gray area. Spectators must stay in the gray area.
- 9. FOOD AND DRINK. Generally, most food and drink should be consumed in the lounge area. Drinks in the firing area should be covered to avoid spills. Individuals who have been handling lead pellets should take care to wash their hands before consuming food. During matches, competing athletes may consume food at their firing points if direct contact between food and hands is avoided.
- 10. SPECIAL EVENTS. During special events or when the use of the Air Range is approved for outside groups, these rules may be modified by the Air Range Director

- as necessary to permit the conduct of such events provided that basic operating and safety rules are not compromised. This specifically includes adopting procedures from National Rifle Association (NRA), Civilian Marksmanship Program (CMP), National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), USA Shooting (USAS) and International Shooting Sport Federation (ISSF) rules as needed. Any rules modifications will be published in the match bulletin or equivalent.
- **11. STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURES.** The Air Range Director may supplement these range rules with additional Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs).

Section III

Changes and Approval

1. REQUIRED. These rules for the Air Range access and safety are subject to change ONLY with the approval of the Air Range Director. Any change of the Air Range Rules must be approved by a simple majority vote of a quorum of the Chapter Board of Directors, published in the next issue of the Chapter newsletter, and confirmed by a simple majority vote of a quorum of the Chapter membership at a regularly scheduled membership meeting. Air Range Rules relating to emergency safety issues may be changed by the Air Range Director with subsequent approval by the Chapter Board of Directors.

PHSRL Championship Tops Off High School Rifle Season

The Potomac High School Rifle League (PHSRL) held their precision air rifle regional championship on February 16 at the Sills Air Range. The league consists of 11 local high school teams from Virginia, Maryland, and the District of Columbia, plus the Mavericks team (for athletes whose school does not have a rifle program). This year, 196 youth shooters participated in the league, with each team shooting at least seven matches. The PHSRL season is capped off by a day-long championship match for the top teams and athletes.

For the team title, West Springfield repeated as regional champion this year (team members Amity Ermarth, Hallie Willis, Momo Gagliano and Julia Perschbacher), breaking their previous championship score from last year with a 2329 out of 2400. Robinson Secondary School (Grace Cason, Scott Patterson, Sally Reeke and Jack Kersey) took the runner-up slot. Full results are available at https://www.orionresults.com/afciwla.

The overall individual winner of this year's championship was Amity Ermarth, a senior from West

Springfield High School, who shot a 593/600 to take home the gold medal. Note that over her high school career, Amity won the individual championship three times. Great job, Amity! Silver went to Niya Burney (Woodson) and bronze went to Hallie Willis (West Springfield).

Woodson High School took the regular season PHSRL Western Conference championship with a perfect 7-0 record. They also set the regular season scoring record with 1163.71 average (Niya Burney, Anna Frazier, Joshua Hilbert, Meredith Ivey, Stephanie Ricigliano). West Potomac High School took the regular season PHSRL Eastern Conference championship with a 5-1 record.

Of interest, the electronic targets and expanded range size have continued to lead directly to significantly higher average scores for the regional championships. Before the air range physical expansion, the average of the top 60 shooters was a very consistent at 540 out of 600. In the first year of the new expanded range (2015-2016), the average rose to 555. This year, the top 60 athletes averaged over 567.

First FCPS Sporter Championship at Sills Air Range



For the first time ever, on February 9 the Sills Air Range hosted the Fairfax County Public School (FCPS) Sporter air-rifle championship. The Sporter discipline uses air rifles that are more affordable and also prohibits the use of target-shooting clothing or other equipment. This makes the discipline much cheaper and perfect for Junior ROTC programs. In fact, all the competing teams were from FCPS JROTC programs. For most of the athletes, it was their first time shooting on electronic targets. Five teams (Edison, Hayfield, Mt. Vernon, South Lakes, and West Potomac) and 31 total athletes competed, with South Lake JROTC taking home the team title, West Potomac JROTC taking the runner-up spot, and Edison JROTC coming in third. The individual winner was Hanna Nelson, with an outstanding 244 out of 300. Noah Davidson and Ryan Sullivan took second and third place respectively. 

Bull Run Muzzle Loaders



Bull Run Muzzle Loaders (BRML) is a National Muzzle Loading Rifle Association (NMLRA) charter club and a proud member of their 1 in 1,000 Endowment programs. The club began in 1987 as an informal group of ten enthusiasts meeting on Sunday mornings to shoot,

socialize, and share experiences. The club grew steadily and in June 1988, BRML became an NMLRA Charter Club. Our shoots are held at the rifle-pistol range of the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., of the Izaak Walton League of America (ARL-FX IWLA) in Centreville, Virginia, on the third Sunday of each month. ARL-FX IWLA is located only minutes from the site of the First Battle of Bull Run, giving the club its name.

Buckskinners, target shooters, novices, experienced shooters, pilgrims, observers, and the curious are all welcome at our shoots. Cap-locks, flint locks, under hammers, right handed or left, in-lines, rifled or

smoothbores (even matchlocks and wheel locks have made appearances) are all allowed in competition as well as noncompetition shooting. The monthly shoots also offer a pistol competition. Only iron sights are permitted in competition.

Membership in BRML isn't required to shoot; everyone is welcome. If you do not have a muzzleloader, we have club rifles and all the makings ready to loan and get you started. Instruction, load development, troubleshooting, and sighting-in assistance are also available. During our shoots, we have exclusive use of the range for muzzle-loading firearms, but anyone who shows up to use the range is given an opportunity to learn how to load and shoot a muzzleloader. It never fails to make them smile. And if a youngin' is with them, with parental permission, they get special instruction and leave with big smiles.

Youth Shotgun Team

Outdoor/Indoor Archery

Archery Update

The indoor archery range is available to all Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., IWLA, members for your use anytime a qualified range officer is on site. The outdoor ranges are open 24/7. Many Chapter members are at the archery range house every morning from approximately 9:30 a.m. until noon. This is a great time to come down, introduce yourself, and find out what archery is all about. If you are new to archery and need advice on anything from bow setup and arrow tuning to shooting technique and equipment, help is available to perform those tasks. We especially would like to encourage youth participation and have a great many youth bows that young shooters may practice with to develop their skills. The outdoor targets butts are at 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 40, 50, and 60 yards. The range is lighted if you would like to shoot in the evening. There is a crossbow station for crossbow shooting. Crossbow targets may be shot with field points or broadheads.

One must only shoot from and through the crossbow station. Crossbow shooting is allowed only at the crossbow station. No shooting from outside the crossbow station. A 28-point field archery course is also available and treestand shooting during daylight hours. No core drilling broadheads are permitted to be shot at the field archery range. These are the *Toxic* and the *Cyclone* and any new core drilling broadheads that come on the market.

Air Bows—Air bows are not allowed to be shot at the Field Archery Range.

For those who are interested in competing in Virginia Bowhunters Association (VBA) archery events, there is a group formed by the Chapter called Cub Run Archers you can join. This group was established so field archery tournaments could be held at

George Washington University Upsets GMU at the 5th Annual Winter Indoor Target Archery Tournament Held March 9 and 10, 2019

The 5th annual Winter Indoor Target Archery Tournament was held on the weekend of March 9 and 10, 2019, at the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., IWLA, indoor archery range. This was a U.S. Archery sanctioned tournament with 69 archers from North Carolina to Massachusetts attending the competition. Sanctioned tournaments allow competing archers to set new nationally recognized records for their division.

Ze Hyun Tony Moon from GWU took top honors with a score of 546 in the collegiate-male-recurve division. Other records for the range were also set including: Michael Raso in Bowman-male-recurve with a score of 358, Joonsuh Oh in Senior-male-recurve with a score of 588, Jim Kerrigan in Master 70-male-recurve with a 550, Leslie Whitaker in Master 70-female-recurve with a 441, Ashby Spratley III in Master 60-male-compound with a 561, and Byron Kissane in Master 70-male-compound with a 534.





The barebow division has captured a huge following in recent years with eight archers participating this year. New range records in this division were captured by Grayson Partlowe in Senior-male-barebow with a 568, Jeff Del Vecchio in Master 50-male-barebow with a 360, Abigail Kovats in Cub-female-barebow with a 380, and Susan Snider in Senior-female-barebow with a 497.

The event hosted 38 recurve archers, 23 compound archers, and 8 barebow archers. Maximum score for all divisions is a 600.

Supporting Pollinators

Erynn and Sara Alvernaz are Junior Girl Scouts from the Girl Scouts Nation's Capital Service Unit 90–4. Sara was a member of the Arlington-Fairfax Youth Chapter and shot with the Junior Olympic Archery Development (JOAD) Team until December 2018. Erynn is currently a member of the JOAD Team and is also on the Competitive Archery Team (CAT) under the supervision of Dan Roberts. She has also joined the Youth Chapter board of directors under the direction of Joe Turner.

Erynn and Sara began working on their Bronze Award for Girl Scouts in 2018. The Bronze Award is the first major service award Girl Scouts can earn. It must benefit the community in some way and each girl must work on the project for a minimum of 20 hours. They learn to identify a problem and possible solutions and then work through the planning and implementation process. The girls must complete the work on their own; however, because this is the first major project the girls complete, an adult may advise and guide as needed.

Erynn and Sara decided they wanted to focus on an environmental issue and identified the need to support increasing the population of pollinators. Pollinators have been declining in recent years for numerous reasons such as habitat loss, pesticide use, and disease. To support this issue, they decided they would like to plant a pollinator garden to provide additional sources of pollen in an environment that is safe for the pollinators.

After joining the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, they learned the Chapter is passionate about wildlife conservation. They were present at the February membership meeting where they learned the Chapter currently has bee hives on the property and will be installing bee houses. They realized a mutual partnership could be possible and decided to approach the Board of Directors about the possibility.

On March 5, 2019, the girls presented to the Chapter board of directors to explain their project and to request permission to plant a pollinator garden within the Chapter grounds. The project was approved and is scheduled to be planted on April 20, 2019.

The pollinator garden will consist of a variety of pollinator friendly plants which are native to Virginia. It will also have two bee watering stations. It is important for bees to stay hydrated to remain healthy and to produce honey. The pollinator garden will support the bees that currently live on the Chapter property and will hopefully attract additional bees to the area. Butterflies and hummingbirds will also be supported within the garden.


