

A Brief History of the Izaak Walton League



At the turn of the 20th century uncontrolled discharges of industrial waste and raw sewage, unrestricted logging, and soil erosion threatened to destroy the nation's most productive waterways. The country's forests, wetlands,

and wilderness areas were quickly disappearing. In 1922, 54 sportsmen declared it was "time to call a halt" to this destruction. Aware that action—not just talk—would be necessary to solve these problems, the group decided to form an organization to combat water pollution and protect

the country's woods and wildlife. As a reminder of their purpose, they named the organization after Izaak Walton, the 17th-century English angler-conservationist who wrote the literary classic, "The Compleat Angler."

The Izaak Walton League of America soon became the nation's preeminent organization of hunters, anglers, and outdoor enthusiasts dedicated to sustainable use of our country's natural resources. Today, the League's more than 43,000 members and 240 community-based chapters are building on the accomplishments of those who preceded them as defenders of the nation's soil, air, woods, waters, and wildlife.

Hope Grows in the Chesapeake Bay

Virginia farmers and cities have made progress in reducing polluted runoff into the Chesapeake Bay, but more remains to be done to restore the health of the bay.

In 2018, heavy rains flushed large amounts nitrogen and phosphorus into the Chesapeake Bay, although wind and other factors kept the size of the resulting "Dead Zone" in the bay at about average size, 1.7 cubic miles. In 2019, additional runoff resulted in a larger Dead Zone expected to average about 2.1 cubic miles.

Excess sediment flowing into the bay clouds the water, blocking out sunlight needed by underwater grasses that provide food, cover, and oxygen for fish, crabs, and other critters.

Despite a rough year or two, some long-term trends are encouraging. The blue crab population has been trending up over the past 20 years and reached nearly 600 million crabs this year. Underwater grasses continue to expand in the bay, although the rain and cloudy water last year made an accurate survey difficult.

The rockfish (striped bass) population in the bay has fallen over the last 15 years, although it may have stabilized. Rockfish numbers remain well above the levels of the 1980s when the population crashed, triggering fishing bans. Oyster numbers remain less than 1 percent of their historic level, but restoration of oyster beds in five Virginia rivers and five more in Maryland is underway.

Virginia communities have completed upgrades on most of Virginia's wastewater treatment plants, more than meeting the state's goals for reducing nitrogen and phosphorus from those sources. But on farms, the progress has been slower.

Since 2002, Virginia has protected more than 1,000 miles of streambank by fencing streams off from cattle, helping reduce phosphorus from cattle manure in our streams. Virginia has helped farmers develop hundreds of conservation plans, but the number of farms actually using soil health practices will need to double by 2025 to meet goals for reducing nitrogen, phosphorus, and sediment runoff from farms.

Federal and state funds provide valuable incentives for farmers to adopt conservation practices that reduce polluted runoff, build healthy soils, and foster healthy rural communities. In the Chesapeake Bay region, the IWLA Agriculture Program is looking for opportunities to secure additional funds for the soil health practices so vital to reducing runoff. The Chapter was originally chartered as the Falls Church Chapter in February 1936. In 1938 the Chapter was renamed the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter.

1939 Facts

- January 26: The Club House Fund was established. Initial funds came from a turkey shoot and raffle held in November 1938.
- *May 15:* Instituted a badge program with a 10-cent fine for any member appearing at a meeting without said badge
- June 14: Participated in a Crab Feast sponsored by the Brunswick Chapter. It was open to the public and the price was 15 cents.

Two Junior Pistol Athletes Win USA Shooting Progressive Position Pistol National Championship





Bhavjeet Sanghera and his sister, Suman Sanghera, were crowned National Champions at the 2019 USA Shooting Progressive Position Pistol National Championship on July 21, 2019, at the CMP South Competition Center, Anniston, Alabama. This is a phenomenal achievement for them and a first for the junior pistol shooting program.

Cadre members of the NoVA Sharpshooters, Bhavjeet and Suman started competing in the discipline of international air pistol two years ago and now also compete in international sport pistol. They attended the 2018 and 2019 USA Shooting Junior Olympics at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colorado, and in 2019 they also

attended the USA Shooting Rifle/Pistol Championships at Fort Benning, Georgia.

The USA Shooting Progressive Position Pistol National Championship is held every summer at two locations: Eastern Region—Anniston, Alabama, and Western Region—Colorado Springs, Colorado. Air pistol matches are held at each location and the top three scoring athletes are announced for the Eastern Region, Western Region, and overall national levels.

Bhavjeet won gold in the men's Eastern Region and Suman won gold in the women's Eastern Region. Their overall scores also sent them to the top to be named overall National Champions.

USA Shooting Assistant National Coach Visits ARL-FX Chapter



Outdoor/Indoor Archery

Archery Update

The indoor archery range is available to all Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., IWLA, members for your use anytime a qualified range officer is on site. The outdoor ranges are open 24/7. Many Chapter members are at the archery range house every morning from approximately 9:30 a.m. until noon. This is a great time to come down, introduce yourself, and find out what archery is all about. If you are new to archery and need advice on anything from bow setup and arrow tuning to shooting technique and equipment, help is available to perform those tasks. We especially would like to encourage youth participation and have a great many youth bows that young shooters may practice with to develop their skills. The outdoor targets butts are at 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 40, 50, and 60 yards. The range is lighted if you would like to shoot in the evening. There is a crossbow station for crossbow shooting. Crossbow targets may be shot with field points or broadheads. One must only shoot from and through the crossbow

one must only shoot from and through the crossbow station. Crossbow shooting is allowed only at the crossbow station. No shooting from outside the crossbow station. A 28-point field archery course is also available and treestand shooting during daylight hours. No core drilling broadheads are permitted to be shot at the field archery range. These are the *Toxic* and the *Cyclone* and any new core drilling broadheads that come on the market.

Air Bows—Air bows are not allowed to be shot at the Field Archery Range.

Cub Run Archers

For those who are interested in competing in Virginia Bowhunters Association (VBA) archery events, there is a group formed by the Chapter called Cub Run Archers you can join. This group was established so field archery tournaments could be held at



the Chapter. Cub Run Archers is a registered VBA club. The VBA is the representative for bowhunters throughout the state of Virginia. Archery 101 Classes

The class will cover the different types of archery equipment, safety, purchasing of equipment, and shooting. We have the bows and arrows and all you need to do is show up. For IWLA members the class is \$20 for adults and \$10 for children with a family max of \$30 per IWLA family. For non-IWLA members the class is \$25 per adult and \$15 for children with a family max of \$40. Class fees will be collected before the start of the class beginning at 12:45 p.m. The minimum age for children is 9 years old. Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., IWLA—Competition Archery Team "Archery is a simple game, it's the mind that complicates it."

Happy fall, archers.

This past month, the Indoor Archery Youth classes have begun. These 12-week sessions are divided among Beginner Youth Archers (ASC-110) and Intermediate Youth Archers (ASC-210). The intent of these lesson areas is to reinforce safety, bring some great fun, and increase interest in the competition aspect of the sport of archery. These classes are conducted from 1 to 5 p.m. on Sundays at the indoor archery range.

New this session is the addition of the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Izaak Walton League of America's Advanced Archery Training Program (ASC-301). This smaller-sized class is conducted on Monday and Wednesday evenings from 7 to 9 p.m. The intent is to focus on refining skills needed for competition and developing commitment to the sport of archery.

The final goal for all the 24 archers across the three classes is to compete at the local, state, and national levels: Indoor FITA Tournament (November 2–3), Virginia State Indoor Championship (February 1–2), and Archery Indoor Nationals (February 28–March 1), respectively. Watch our newsletter for updates on how well these archers do in the upcoming competition archery tournaments.


will need to bring trash bags with you for proper disposal of all parts of the carcass. When finished, be sure to wash the area down completely, putting all remains in plastic bags before putting them into any dumpster. During cold weather, when finished be sure to drain the hose of water to keep it from freezing.

Upgrade of the Archery Flagpole Area

If you happen to venture to the Field Archery range, you will notice a tremendous difference in front of the clubhouse. *Mason Feathers*, son of IWLA member *Mike Feathers*, just completed a face lift on the flagpole area. This project completes Mason's quest for his Boy Scout rank of Eagle. When Mason approached us regarding this project, the front corner of the archery field house was a mess. The bushes were overgrown and the weeds had overtaken the ground cover. Mason presented the concept to the ARL-FX IWLA board of directors in August and received approval.

After numerous discussions, Mason and his team cleaned out the area, removed all the old ground cover, trimmed and shaped the three trees, power-washed the donated paving stones and the Cub Run podium, and then rebuilt the area. They even found the old ARL-FX IWLA sign behind all the clutter, so that was given a once over to clean it up. Mason built a new birdhouse for the area.

The end results are amazing. *Bob Walla*, president of Cub Run Archers, *Fred Ansick*, range captain, and all the ARL-FX IWLA archery members would like to thank Mason for his efforts. We would also like to thank Eric Eifler for the donation of over 100 paving stones.
