

# ARL-FX Chapter Closure (Coronavirus/COVID-19)

As the government response to COVID-19 changed over time, the Chapter's response also changed. With the first round of government recommended restrictions, the Chapter reduced, postponed, and canceled activities. Directors of specific ranges and areas could decide what activities were allowed and if their area was open for use. As the virus response from the government progressed to closing all nonessential businesses, the Chapter closed all buildings/field houses. With these being closed, this meant there is no restroom access should you have visited the property. As the response continued to change, on March 30th the Chapter's president moved to close the entire Chapter, which included all activities and ranges on the property. This decision was made in the best interest of the Chapter and its members. *Currently the decision to close is in effect until June 10, 2020, or until the governor rescinds his order*. # **Chapter's New Parking Lot Addition/Dry Swale**

The new Chapter parking lot addition was completed at the end of February 2020 and added approximately 80 parking spaces. In addition to the new parking, the Chapter was required by Fairfax County to include a storm water protection feature called a dry swale. A dry swale catches, contains, and improves the quality of

the water runoff from the parking lot before it flows back into a stream. They are especially useful to contain nitrates and metals present in the runoff. A dry swale is not supposed to remain wet over time as it allows the water to drain after slowing it and allowing contaminants to settle out. A wet swale is designed to hold water most of the time, allowing the water to seep out slowly.

These new parking spaces will greatly help with events and meetings being held at the Chapter field house, to include the Chapter picnic and disabled picnic that are held yearly and help to keep the fire lane clear for emergencies. The parking spaces will also be used for overflow from the Shotgun, Air, and Rifle-Pistol Ranges.

We want to thank the five who put so much time and effort into this project.



You should be well aware by now of what went on in Richmond and how it could affect us. We dodged some of the worst pieces of legislation for now. SB 353 would have closed the Rifle-Pistol and Skeet & Trap ranges. HB 961 would have outlawed any magazine over 12 rounds. They are not gone, they were "Continued to 2021" and 2021 is not a Presidential-election year so we have to be even more vigilant.

SB 353 "prohibits the operation of an outdoor shooting range, defined in the bill, within 500 yards of any property zoned for residential use unless the Range Design Criteria developed by the U.S. Department of Energy, Office of Health, Safety and Security have been met." Interesting that they picked a DOE range criteria specification and not NRA, HSSF, or even DoD. You can read the entire criteria at <a href="https://www.energy.gov/sites/prod/files/2013/05/f1/Range\_Design\_Criteria.pdf">https://www.energy.gov/sites/prod/files/2013/05/f1/Range\_Design\_Criteria.pdf</a>. I believed they picked that spec because it is a "Cadillac" of a specification and I don't believe any outdoor range in Virginia meets all the criteria, we don't.

The Arlington-Fairfax Chapter is an IRS 501(c)3 nonprofit and we are limited in what we can do politically. If you don't like what is happening, join the organizations that can take more direct action. NRA, GOA, and 2nd Amendment Foundation at the national level. Virginia Shooting Sports Association and Virginia Citizen's Defense League at the state level.

If you don't like what is happening (or do) another important thing is to get registered and vote. Volunteering for your party is another easy thing you can do and is very valuable. Decide what you would like to do as a volunteer. There are many options starting with working directly for your party. This includes making phone calls, going door-to-door, volunteering on election days, helping at a campaign headquarters, helping register people to vote, volunteering at events, and much more. Contact your state or local offices about how to volunteer. You can find contact information on party state offices on the party Web site and you can find contact information for local offices of your state's party.

The next step up is to become an election officer and later an election chief. I have been one in Fairfax County for seven years and the primary on March 3 was my 12th election. These are the people that actually run the polling place. It is a long day, but you get paid for your time. Policy is that the election officers are supposed to be equally divided between the parties, but at the Lake Braddock precinct (where I have been assigned) there are nowhere near enough Republicans. Going back to the paragraph above, as an assistant chief, part of my job is to assistant the chief. I would regularly check on the party people that are giving out sample ballots in front of the polling place to ensure they stay more than 40 feet from the door. At Lake Braddock there are usually a dozen or so Democrats and one or no Republicans.

The biggest election I have seen to date was the 2016 Presidential and the 2020 is expected to be larger. Fairfax County is the largest jurisdiction in Virginia with 243 precincts countywide. It takes thousands of enthusiastic and trained election officers to help ensure we have a fair, efficient, and well-run election. 

## **Use of Outhouses**

IMPORTANT: Septic tanks are used for the outhouses



on the property. Trash (plastic bottles, bags, etc.) should never be disposed of in an outhouse for any reason. Trash cloqs the septic tank and the Chapter has to pay to get it cleared. Groups may be charged these costs if the septic tank becomes cloqqed while they use the property.



# **High School Rifle Season Ends**

The Potomac High School Rifle League (PHSRL) held their precision air rifle regional championship on February 15th at the ARL-FX Chapter's Sills Air Range. The league consists of nine local high school teams from Virginia, Maryland, and the District of Columbia, plus the Mavericks team (for athletes whose school does not have a rifle program). This year exactly 200 youth shooters participated in the league, with each team shooting a ten-match schedule. The PHSRL season is capped off by a day-long championship match for the top teams and athletes.

For the team title, Robinson Secondary School edged out Woodson High School by a score of 2340 to 2332. Both teams broke the previous regional championship record. Robinson was represented by team members Scott Patterson, Jack Kersey, Sally Reeke, and Andrew Morris. Woodson was represented by Stephanie Ricigliano, Meredith Ivey, Nate Wehrlen, and Victoria Kopelen. Lake Braddock took third place and West Springfield fourth place. The overall individual winner of this year's championship was **Stephanie Ricigliano**, a senior from Woodson, who shot a 591/600 to take home the gold

medal. Silver went to **Scott Patterson** (Robinson) and bronze went to **Jack Kersey** (Robinson).

Woodson High School won the PHSRL regular season with a perfect 10-0 record and set the record for a 30-shot match at 1178. Robinson Secondary School also got into the record book when they claimed the regular season scoring record with a 1164.89 average (Jack Kersey, Andrew Morris, Scott Patterson, Payton Peppard, Sally Reeke). Robinson finished second in the regular season with a 9-1 record, with Lake Braddock third at 8-2, and West Springfield fourth at 7-3. Scott Patterson also tied the individual ten-shot record with an outstanding 299 out of 300.

The Megalink electronic targets and expanded range size have continued to lead directly to significantly higher average scores for the regional championships. Before the air range physical expansion, the average of the top 60 shooters was a very consistent at 540 out of 600. In the first year of the new expanded range (2015-2016), the average rose to 555. Last year, the top 60 athletes averaged over 567. This year, the top 60 averaged over 569. This closely tracks the increase in regular season averages, also an increase of two points over last year.

# Colonel Birt Kidwell Winter Skeet and Trap League 2020 Season Winners

The 2020 season of the Winter Skeet and Trap League concluded two weeks early on Sunday, March 16th, due to health concerns of the on-going COVID-19 pandemic. The season began January 5th with our normal 13-week schedule. Given the unusually warm winter, we were projected to make it through the entire season with no weather-related cancellations. All 28 teams were able to complete 10 of the scheduled 12 matches, so this year's award winners were based on the individual and team standings as of the season close.

In the individual competition, our high overall average winner was John Spicer, who broke 475 of 500 targets equating to a combined average of 23.750. Jim Hickerson took the honors for high-skeet average with an impressive 24.300 hitting 243 of 250 targets. Right behind him in a three-way tie for skeet runner-up were John Murphy, Tim Tynan, and Simon Williams, all breaking 237 targets. The skeet runner-up winner will be determined through a future shoot-off. In trap, the high average winner was Mike Campbell, ending the season with an average of 23.900 hitting 239 of 250 targets. The runner-up for high trap was Travis Rockwood, coming in with a 23.700 average. In the most improved category, John Dwyier beat out several other contenders to capture the award with a combined average improvement from last season of 4.342 targets.

Team competition takes place in two categories: one based on team points won in head-to-head matches each week against another team and the second based on cumulative team scores over the entire season. The top five teams in each category earn an award for all six team members, with no team permitted to receive an award in both categories. The competition was fierce with the winners being decided by tenths in the team scores.

In the Cumulative Team Score Category, team captain Brian Hickerson led his squad to a season score of 1,991.953 to lock down the 1st place award. Joining Brian were Team 15 members Alan Hickerson, Ben Hickerson, Glenn Hickerson, Jim Hickerson, and Marcelo LaBarca. Team 10 landed in the 2nd place slot with a score of 1,981.077 led by team captain Rick Diana and members Dan Diana, Bill Hobson, Mark Koury, Bill McCloud, and Charlie Schulz. Third place was won by Team 3 with a score of 1,975.516 led by team captain Gary Weiss and members Mike Campbell, Andy Egeland, Jeff Egeland, John Frazee, and Danny Weiss. Team 20 captured

4th Place coming in with a score of 1,972.627 led by team captain Steve Canale with members Tom Delewski, Imran Hussain, Ashly Palles, John Seals, Tim Tynan. The 5th place finisher was Team 27 with a score of 1,966.770 led by team captain Bill Leonard and members KC Haile, Dave Hargrave, Henry Lucas, Jeff Powell, and Rachel Rittler.

First place in the Team Points competition went to Team Number 14, captained by James Hsu, with 25.0 points. Joining James were Mark Brill, Joe Graziano, John Hsu, George Mong, and Derek Slusher. Jeff Miller's Team 4 took the 2nd place honors with 23.0 points consisting of Benn Crandall, Warren Guillett, Kevin Miller, Suzanne Miller, and Dave Wabeke. Team 24 with 20.0 points captured 3rd place with team captain Bill Ridenour and members Ken Lyons, Devin Ridenour, Patrick Ridenour, Thomas Ridenour, and **John Spicer.** Fourth place went to Team 7 with 19.0 points and members Ed Janik, Mindy Knowlton, Pat Leedom, Alex Marshall, Dan Perret, and team captain Travis Rockwood. Taking Fifth Place award was Team 28 with 17.5 points led by team captain Jacob Hueskes and members Bob Burnett, Modi El-Zoghbi, David Holden, Cash Miller, and Anthony Palumbo.

Congratulations to all of our awardees for their consistent performance and excellent marksmanship. Special thanks go out to **Pete Bills** for keeping facilities in good order and the hamburgers stocked each weekend and to **Gregg Hanson** for his IT support. **Bob Brino**, director of Trap and Skeet, also deserves a thank you from all the league members for his gracious hospitality, willingness to

# Skeet & Trap Field House Spring Cleaning





# **Outdoor/Indoor Archery**

### **Archery Update**

The indoor archery range is available to all Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., IWLA, members for your use anytime a qualified range officer is on site. The outdoor ranges are open 24/7. Many Chapter members are at the archery range house every morning from approximately 9:30 a.m. until noon. This is a great time to come down, introduce yourself, and find out what archery is all about. If you are new to archery and need advice on anything from bow setup and arrow tuning to shooting technique and equipment, help is available to perform those tasks. We especially would like to encourage youth participation and have a great many youth bows that young shooters may practice with to develop their skills. The outdoor targets butts are at 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 40, 50, and 60 yards. The range is lighted if you would like to shoot in the evening.

There is a crossbow station for crossbow shooting. Crossbow targets may be shot with field points or broadheads. One must only shoot from and through the crossbow station. Crossbow shooting is allowed only at the crossbow station. No shooting from outside the crossbow station. A 28-point field archery course is also available and tree-stand shooting during daylight hours. No core drilling broadheads are permitted to be shot at the field archery range. These are the Toxic and the Cyclone and any new core drilling broadheads that come on the market.

**Air Bows**—Air bows are not allowed to be shot at the Field Archery Range.

#### **Cub Run Archers**

For those who are interested in competing in Virginia Bowhunters Association (VBA) archery events, there is a group formed by the Chapter called Cub Run Archers you can join. This group was established so field archery tournaments could be held at



the Chapter. Cub Run Archers is a registered VBA club. The VBA is the representative for bowhunters throughout the state of Virginia. # Field Archery March 21st Work Party

We rebuilt the parking lot fence, installed Rinehart walls for the crossbow station at 20, 30, and 40 yards, connected the lights at 30- and 40-yard targets, raked out new gravel pathways, installed an Ironman target at 40 yards, turned around all the Pacific Bow Butts, installed new signs, built a fence behind target #26, flipped target butts at #7 and #10, rebuilt the backstop at #24, installed Field and Hunter targets, and a few other activities.

I want to thank the volunteers that came out to support—Jarrett Rhodes, Jim Orourke, Brian Martinez, Scott Petersen, Frank Fair, Nike Fair, Cynthia Sarah and Megan Peacock, Martin and Leila Gamache, Scott and Michael Raso, Yongge Liu, and Mike Cinnamon for cooking us lunch.

# **JOAD Archery State Indoor Results**

The ARL-FX Chapter's JOAD (Junior Olympic Archery Development) program is in full swing. Classes are 12 weeks long and offered on Sundays at various times of the year. This session started on Sunday, January 12th and runs until Sunday, April 5th. Due to the increase in enrollment, this required us to offer four classes, two advanced classes and two beginner classes, which use the indoor range from 12 to 6 p.m. on Sundays.
