

December Adopt-A-Highway Clean Up

The Chapter conducted an Adopt-A-Highway road clean up on Compton Road and Mount Olive Road on December 13th. There were 11 Chapter participants who spent three hours in our efforts for a total of 33 man-hours. Both roads appeared to have been recently mowed as there was no long grass along either roadway and not a lot of trash. We collected 16 bags of trash, totaling 88 pounds, plus a tire weighing 19 pounds, a tire tread (from a retreaded tire?) that weighed 18 pounds, an empty 5-gallon bucket that weighed about 3 pounds, and a throw rug weighing about six pounds for a total of 134 pounds of trash collected.

A First for the Chapter

The Arlington-Fairfax Chapter has been heavily involved with Adaptive/Paralympic shooting. For many years adaptive/paralympic shooting has only had two classifications:

- **SH1:** Pistol and rifle competitors who must sit down, but do not require a shooting stand.
- **SH2:** Rifle competitors who do not have the ability to support the weight of the air rifle with their arms and require a shooting/spring stand.

There is a new classification coming for those that are visually impaired: **SHVI.** It will possibly be a "demonstration sport" at the Paris Olympics in 2024 and could possibly be included in the games in Los Angeles in 2028. The big question is how does it work? I could make jokes about its ZEN and you have to BE the pellet and think it to the center of the target, but actually we tape an IR LED, 60mm below the center of the target and there is a sensor on the rifle. The green LED just tells you that the IR LED is getting power. The sensor has headphones attached and they provide a rising tone when the rifle is moving closer to the center of the target.

Now for the Firsts. On November 7, 2020, the Sills Air Range had the first SHVI match held outside the Olympic Training Center in the United States.

The young lady in the picture is Delany Brooks. She is blind from birth. She just missed shooting 500 out of a possible 600 in her first ever match.

The second picture is Jim Sadecki. He started visually impaired shooting in January 2018 at the Olympic Training Center. In October 2019 he took a bronze medal at the World

Cup in Sydney, Australia, and he came all the way down from Connecticut to shoot in our match.

The Chapter has everything they need to get started. So, if you know someone, who is physically challenged and wants to get involved in competitive shooting or just shoot to have fun, please contact Tom Ciarula at *Tom*.

Requested Proposed Revisions to Bylaws

Purpose & Rationale: To update and clarify existing Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., IWAL, bylaws. These will be voted on by the membership at the February 2021 general membership meeting. (Approved by the BoD at their January 5, 2021, meeting.) Revisions are denoted by **Strikethrough** and **Bold Italic**.

ARTICLE I

Membership (Page 7)

1. ELIGIBILITY. Any person who is of good character, eighteen (18) years of age or older, may be elected to membership. Applicants shall attend a new member orientation, pay the required dues, and initiation fee, do six (6) hours of required service work at to the Chapter, and then shall be considered for membership (with restricted range and Chapter privileges until the required six (6) hour service work is performed, to expire after a time period determined by the Board) by the Chapter members present at a regular membership meeting. Once the member performs the required six (6) hours of service work they will then be granted full range and Chapter privileges and receive their permanent range badge. The Board of Directors may authorize a fee in lieu of service hours.

2021 Chapter Education and Training Program

The Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., IWLA, Education and Training Program provides students with the knowledge, skills, and attitude necessary for the safe ownership and use of firearms across the shooting disciplines of rifle, pistol, and shotgun. All training events are open to the general public and the tuition is very competitive.

The 2021 schedule of events consists of 25 formal NRA courses and shooting clinics, including basic- to intermediate-level firearms training, ammunition reloading, instructor training, and shooting coach schools. Courses are being offered throughout the year. All Chapter-sponsored training events are taught by a team of over 25 volunteer NRA-certified instructors, training counselors, and shooting coaches. These men and women possess a wealth of knowledge across all the shooting sport disciplines and have a passion to share their expertise with shooters of all skill levels.



IMPORTANT: Septic tanks are used for the outhouses on the property. Trash (plastic bottles, bags, etc.) should never be disposed of in an outhouse for any reason. Trash clogs the septic tank and the Chapter has to pay to get it cleared. Groups may be charged these costs if the septic tank becomes clogged while they use the property.

News from National IWLA

Plan to Stem Pollutants Falls Short

The Chesapeake Bay Program, Chesapeake Bay Trust, Center for Watershed Protection, and Chesapeake Conservancy are looking for input on a draft Conowingo Watershed Implementation Plan designed to help meet pollution problems in the Chesapeake Bay that travel down the Susquehanna River. The draft plan is an addition to a set of state Watershed Implementation Plans designed to reduce the nitrogen, phosphorus, and sediment flowing into the Chesapeake Bay and restore the health of the bay.

Virginia and other Chesapeake states have been implementing Watershed Implementation Plans since 2010 to reduce polluted runoff into the bay.

The new draft plan was deemed necessary once studies confirmed that the reservoir behind Conowingo Dam has filled with sediment and no longer stops and stores nutrient-laden sediment from upstream. Conowingo is a large hydroelectric dam northeast of Baltimore near where the Susquehanna enters Chesapeake Bay. The primary goal of the plan is to reduce nitrogen flowing from the Susquehanna River into the bay by six million pounds per year.



The plan identifies nutrient management and reduced tilling of cropland as important solutions, but fails to embrace effective soil health practices like planting cover crops in the winter to hold soil in place and take up excess nitrogen in cropland. Sadly, the report does not even mention the benefits of rebuilding healthy soils to conserve soil and reduce runoff of nitrogen, phosphorus, and sediment from cropland.

The draft plan also fails to identify a dedicated source of funding to put in place the practices needed to reduce polluted runoff. For more information visit www. chesapeakebay.net/issues/conowingo_dam.

League Proposes National Soil Health Initiative

The Izaak Walton League of America has asked Presidentelect Joe Biden and his transition team to make soil health a priority in the new administration, and to launch a national soil health initiative to help farmers and ranchers adopt systems that will rebuild America's soils.

Healthy soils reduce polluted runoff from farms and ranches, reduce erosion, store carbon in the soil, and reduce flooding. Soil health practices like planting winter cover crops and rotational grazing also provide benefits for wildlife. Investments in soil health systems allow farmers to save money by using much less fertilizer, pesticides, and fuel.

The League proposed a national soil health initiative that would help farmers and ranchers develop and implement soil health plans, providing education and financial assistance through existing Department of Agriculture programs. The League has also proposed a new *State & Tribal Soil Health Grant Program* that would help states develop and implement soil health strategies that match their soils, weather, and farming systems.

Virginia Shooting Sports Association State Junior Pistol Championships Held at ARL-FX Chapter Ranges on September 27, 2020

Twenty junior pistol athletes competed in the Virginia Shooting Sports Association (VSSA) State Championship held Sunday, September 27, 2020. The ARL-FX NoVA Sharpshooters sponsored the competition which included two events: sport pistol and air pistol.

In the morning, six athletes gathered at the Rifle-Pistol Range to compete in sport pistol. This event uses a .22 long rifle semiauto pistol with iron sights. Targets are placed at 25 yards. The 60-shot match includes two stages: precision and rapid fire. During the precision stage, shooters fire 30 shots at a precision target. This stage is very similar to NRA bullseye slow fire. During the rapid-fire stage, shooters fire 30 shots at a rapid-fire target. The rapid-fire stage is not like NRA bullseye. In sport pistol rapid fire, the shooters fire six series of five and at the fire signal the shooter raises the gun to the target and has three seconds to fire the shot.

VSSA President Joe Turner presented awards to the top three competitors as well as medals to the winners in various age categories. It is worthy to note these six athletes went on to compete in the second event, the 10-meter air pistol.

In the afternoon, fourteen juniors competed in the 10-meter air pistol match held at the Sills Air Range. During the 10-meter air pistol match, athletes used a .177 caliber air pistol with iron sights and fired 60 shots at an electronic target placed at 10 meters.

The air pistol event included two qualification relays with the top eight athletes going on to compete in a finals match. The finals match uses an elimination process. A total

of 24 shots determines the winner of the finals match. Points from the finals match are then added to the qualification match score to determine the overall champion.

VSSA President Joe Turner presented awards to the top three competitors as well as medals to the winners in various age groups. (J2 is 15 to 17 years old and J3 is 14 and under.)

NoVA Sharpshooters Host the 2020-2021 Virginia USA Shooting Pistol Junior Olympics State Championship

Every year USA Shooting invites shooting clubs across the United States to host qualification matches called Junior Olympic State Championships (JOSCs). These events allow junior athletes to compete shoulder-to-shoulder with their counterparts from across their resident state as well as nonresidents. For the past three years, the NoVA Sharpshooters have hosted these qualification matches at the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter of the Izaak Walton Leaque of America.

This year athletes, parents, and coaches all pitched in to put this event together in spite of the COVID 19 pandemic. Following Virginia guidelines, the club successfully hosted the Sport Pistol and Air Pistol JOSCs allowing 26 athletes to compete for qualification scores and potential invitations to the USA Shooting Junior Olympics planned for 2021.

On Sunday morning, November 22, 2020, seven athletes from the NoVA Sharpshooters and Team LocoMotion met at the Rifle-Pistol Range for a 60-shot sport pistol match. Suman Sanghera placed first, winning the Junior Women gold medal and also recognition as the Virginia State Champion. Josephine Mou won the silver medal and Lauren Creese won the bronze. For the junior men, Victor Mou won the gold medal, Ethan Jardines placed second winning the silver medal, and William Regala won bronze.

After the sport-pistol match, these seven athletes participated in the air pistol JOSC held across the road at the Sills Air Range. Nineteen junior athletes from the NoVA Sharpshooters, Team LocoMotion (Purcellville), Rockin' Rockets (Rockingham County 4-H), Lafayette Gun Club (Grafton), and an independent shooter from Frederick, Maryland, competed in the 60-shot match. Since there were six or more competitors in each gender category, a state champion could be named for both the junior men and the junior women.

For the junior women, Suman Sanghera again placed first, winning the gold medal and recognition as the state junior women champion. Makenzie Anne Wygans from the Lafayette Gun Club won silver and Christina Alvarez won bronze. For the junior men, Bhavjeet Sanghera placed first, winning the gold medal and recognition as the state junior men's champion. Victor Mou won silver and William Regala won bronze.

These athletes scored high enough to earn automatic invites to the 2021 Junior Olympics: Suman Sanghera (sport and air pistol), Bhavjeet Sanghera (air pistol), and William Regala (air pistol). When all the clubs across the country complete their matches and report their scores, USA Shooting will establish cutoff scores for each event and age category. Then USA Shooting will extend invitations to athletes for the 2021 Junior Olympics. The Olympic Training



Rifle-Pistol Range Baffles

The roof and baffles at the Rifle-Pistol Range are approaching the end of their usable lives. Their replacement will be expensive and be a major disruption to use of the range. One of the existing issues is the supports for the roof do not line up with the supports for the baffles. This results in uneven spacing of the firing points. Changing the spacing of the roof supports from 10 feet to 8 feet matches the baffle supports spacing (currently 16 feet), will increase the number of firing points, and could potentially add short range firing points. On the

left side of the range, the baffles do not go all the way to the side berm to allow for heavy equipment access. What we are considering is to cut a new access through the left side berm behind the 20-yard baffle and use the dirt for a 20-yard backstop. The current roof line is 165 feet long. This gives room for fourteen 8-foot wide, full-range firing lanes and seven 6-foot wide, close-range lanes, under the existing roof line. There are still a lot of details to be worked out. Below is a sketch of the concept.

Air Range

The Air Range, Part III: Where We Are Going

Because of the revenue generated by increased range use, matches, and clinics, the air range operation is financially healthy. For the past four years, the air range received **NO** operating funds from the Chapter budget. While utilities and major facility maintenance (like a new air conditioner) are covered by the Chapter, all other range operating expenses are paid by air range proceeds, fundraising, or donations.

My father-in-law has a rule about picking restaurants while travelling. He only stops at a restaurant if the parking lot is full based on the premise the place must be good if there are many vehicles outside. Using that rule, the air range is a success! Unfortunately, that meant during matches and clinics, especially on weekends when other Chapter activities are also busy, parking is at a premium and the lots are very crowded. This led the Chapter to make another major investment in a new parking lot to benefit activities at the air range, the field house, and by proxy, relieving parking at rifle-pistol, shotgun, and archery. Again, much of the labor was donated, but the parking lot itself did require \$145K in Chapter capital. This is another investment in the future.

I've spent a lot of time over this article series talking about the activities and upgrades associated with the air range. Going back to my point at the start, our Chapter needs compelling and vibrant offerings if we're going to attract and retain members to keep the Chapter viable over the coming decades. I believe one of those engines of growth is the air range. This is for two reasons. First is because this is one of several chapter activities exposing youth to the shooting sports. Put bluntly, if we don't attract the youth, the shooting sports will eventually die out. Second is the knock-on positive impact on Chapter membership when parents join the Chapter solely due to their kids. To be honest, I did not know IWLA existed until my daughter joined her high school air rifle team. I certainly would not have joined the Chapter or decided to volunteer for the board if not for the Chapter having so generously supported high school air rifle. In a quick poll of the most active air range volunteers, 78 percent of them joined the Chapter only because their offspring became involved in our air gun program. A classic quote was "I'd never heard of IWLA until my kid started (air) rifle."

Our Chapter has spent significant capital resources in the past few years to improve the air range. First for the facility

expansion and most lately for the parking lot. Although I argue "spent" is the wrong term to use—we have *invested* in our Chapter's future by putting resources down on an activity that attracts youth members and also brings in their middleaged parents. These are desirable membership demographics that help ensure our IWLA Chapter remains viable and vibrant long into the future. I can think of few better ways to invest our Chapter resources.

Finally, the air range isn't open just to junior members. Adult members are very welcome—club air guns are available to borrow—and there are open practice opportunities on Monday and Friday evenings. We did try Sunday morning sessions for over a year, but only one or two people ever show up (sometimes none). In addition, there's an adult Bullseye air pistol league that has restarted this year and several of our air rifle matches are open to adults (although be prepared for the juniors to outshoot you). The air range could be open many weekdays for adult member practice, but to be frank, we don't have volunteer RSOs for those times. Most of our current air range volunteers work full time and devote their range hours to youth shooting sports in the evenings. Anyone interested in getting checked out as an air range RSO and working during the weekdays or weekends should drop me a note—we always need more volunteers.

As a Chapter, we should be proud of the investment we've made in our air range. We are known around the country as a place that produces top notch shooting athletes. The USA Shooting national coaches in rifle, pistol, and adaptive shooting are very familiar with our operation, as are the many college coaches who come here to teach and recruit. We are a regional hub for matches and clinics—people love to come compete at our facility. But most importantly, our Chapter investment is building a pipeline for the future by introducing youth (and their parents) to the shooting sports and the proper exercise of Second Amendment rights, while at the same time sustaining and growing our IWLA Chapter membership rolls. I'm personally grateful to our Chapter for this support because I have seen it mold and shape young men and women in a most positive way. Bob Hardy Perpetual Cup Dedicated to Long-Time Chapter Member

There was a time when high school shooting sports in northern Virginia almost died. In the '90s and early '00s, many local high school ranges were closing and teams were being disbanded. This was partly due to reasonable safety concerns about lead contamination, but exacerbated by increasing negative feeling about guns



in general. This was a dire situation.

Then came a small group of men and women who basically saved youth rifle sports in northern Virginia by promoting the emerging sport of air rifle as a replacement for high school smallbore shooting teams. Bob Hardy, a long time ARL-FX IWLA Chapter member, was one of those key volunteers. Bob was also head coach of the powerhouse Robinson rifle team for many years and remains as coach emeritus. In recognition of his vital contributions, a new perpetual trophy was created to be awarded to the Potomac High School Rifle League (PHSRL) air rifle champions each year. This trophy is called the Bob Hardy Cup and will be permanently displayed in the Sills Air Range.

Due to COVID, unveiling of the Hardy Cup took place largely over remote video, with a scattering of attendees at the air range. Bob and much of his extended family were online, as were other long-time youth shooting volunteers such as Bob Long and the Ramsays. Roger Thrasher (air range director) talked about the concept for the trophy,





with the Sills Air Range partnering with Dave Cunningham (Robinson head coach) and Wanlace Yates (PHSRL president). Podium Pellets in Colorado Springs manufactured a milled and anodized giant pellet, which was then locally mounted on a walnut base. In a word, the trophy is stunning and on a par with the best shooting

trophies anywhere. Stop by the air range to take a look.

Fortunately, the legacy of Bob and other volunteers like him lives on to today. Several generations of parents and coaches have stepped into the gap providing continued life-changing shooting opportunities for local youth and high school programs. Big thanks to Bob Hardy for setting an example for all of us to emulate.



Outdoor/Indoor Archery

Indoor Archery Range Open for Evening Shooting

Come on out and keep your archery skills at peak performance. The indoor archery range will be open Monday through Thursday evenings 6:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. until March 12, subject to the availability of range officers.

Limited Broadhead Use on Outdoor Archery Range

The indoor and 3-D archery ranges are for **field tip use ONLY**, no broadheads are allowed on these ranges. The outdoor archery range does provide broadhead targets, but only on the target butts marked in bright red stating **"BROADHEADS OK."** These target butts are located at the crossbow station and include 20, 30, and 40 yard Rienehart (4' x 4' black target butts).

There are also 2' x 2' target butts with **RED dots** that may be used for broadheads, and the **RED cube dice** at 50 yards. In other words, if there is a **RED "BROADHEADS OK" sign** or **RED dots** on the block target butts, these may be used for broadheads.

All other targets are for field tips only. This includes any 3-D targets that may be placed on the range. All coredrilling broadheads are strictly prohibited on the Chapter archery ranges.

Damage to the target blocks and 3-D animals on the outdoor range has occurred in the recent weeks. Anyone witnessing broadhead usage on these targets should notify the archery range officer or any Cub Run officer. As stated on the ARL-FX IWLA/Cub Run Archers Web site range rules (Section 11 PROHIBITIONS—https://www.cubrunarchers.org/using-the-range--range-rules.html):

"Anyone observed ... shooting broadhead-tipped arrows at other than targets expressly designed for that purpose will be referred to the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, IWLA, board of directors for disciplinary action."

Archery Qualifying for the Fairfax County Park Program

As of February 2021, the dates have not been released by Fairfax County for qualifying for the 2021/2022 park archery program. Qualifying will be held at the field archery range on Tuesday evenings, 6 p.m. until dark and Sunday mornings, 9 a.m. until 12 noon. Deer Processing Station

For all Chapter deer hunters who would like to process their deer, the deer processing station is twenty yards off the Field Archery deck. The area is lighted and has running water from a garden hose located by the deck entrance. You will need to bring trash bags with you for proper disposal of all parts of the carcass. When finished be sure to wash the area down completely, putting all remains in trash bags before going into any dumpster. During cold weather, when finished be sure to drain the hose of water to keep it from freezing.
