

Coming to the Chapter over twenty years ago, Chuck arrived with advanced fishing skills, and was equally adept with both fly rod and the heavier saltwater tackle. His contributions of fresh fillets and the latest stories made him more than welcome at a number of Chapter dinners.

In March 2002, Chuck was a charter member of the fledgling, five-member, Fat Tuesday Fellowship Farm Feed, which met for dinner every Tuesday evening, at the Rifle-Pistol range house. At the time of his passing, he had become a pillar of this fellowship gathering, which was a perfect fit for his sociable, gregarious personality. Over its twenty-year history, Chuck was an indispensable team player and a dependable regular, in providing this weekly dinner for the growing group of diners. No one ever had to ask him to help. He looked for what needed to be done, and took care of it.

Early in his time at the Chapter, Chuck became active at the Rifle-Pistol range, and soon volunteered to serve his fellow shooters with regular duty as a range safety officer.

Save Our Streams Volunteer Opportunities

New Funding for Farm Conservation

In August, Congress passed and the president signed legislation that will provide \$19.5 billion over the next few years to expand conservation, reduce water pollution, and combat climate change across tens of millions of acres of farms and ranches nationwide.

The new funds are part of the Inflation Reduction Act, sweeping legislation designed to deliver nearly \$370 billion for solar, wind and biofuel energy, energy conservation, and other strategies to address climate change.

Virginia Rep. Abigail Spanberger, who chairs the House Agriculture Committee's Conservation & Forestry Subcommittee, said "I'm proud to see this legislation include provisions I championed on behalf of Virginia's crop and livestock producers that will allow them to better integrate climate-smart practices into their operations — meaning long-term benefits for both their wallets and our natural resources," said Spanberger. "Smart and responsible investments in voluntary conservation initiatives will help bring them to the table and demonstrate how America's farmers can be a part of the solution."

For Virginia, the bill could translate into \$150 million or more in the next several years from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to help meet the growing demand from farmers for information and financial assistance to put in place soil health practices on cropland and pastures.

In 2019 and 2020, more than 70 percent of farmers and ranchers who applied for help nationwide through USDA conservation programs like the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) and Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) were turned down.

The new funding is earmarked for on-farm practices that greenhouse gas pollution or store carbon in the soil, but most of the farm practices that will accomplish that also provide a host of other benefits for soil conservation, fish and wildlife habitat, and water quality.

Most of the USDA conservation funds coming to Virginia annually—over \$50 million per year —are for the EQIP or CSP programs. EQIP (\$34 million in 2021) provides

help for farmers to adopt specific practices, like planting a winter cover crop to feed the soil and prevent erosion, soil testing to allow farmers to apply less fertilizer, or installing fencing and water in pastures to allow livestock to be moved to fresh grass every day.

The CSP (\$13 million in 2021) helps farmers adopt wholefarm conservation plans that use systems like Integrated Pest Management, or bundles of soil health practices, to address conservation needs throughout their farm.

The Agricultural Conservation Easement Program typically gets less than \$3 million per year in Virginia, but it helps landowners restore wetlands and put permanent easements on wetlands, grasslands, and cropland, especially areas threatened by urban development.

The new legislation provides substantial new funding for all three programs, and for the Regional Conservation Partnership Program which leverages USDA conservation funds with state and local partners to put conservation practices in place in a specific watershed or area.

USDA has used the program to help Franklin County dairy farmers implement conservation practices that improve soil health and reduce polluted runoff into the Roanoke River, help increase oyster habitat in the Chesapeake Bay, and help farmers throughout the Chesapeake Bay area adopt better soil health and nutrient management practices.

The legislation is a one-time infusion of cash over several years that can do a lot to put conservation measures in place on Virginia farmland. The new legislation will help address the long-term problem of USDA conservation programs that are perennially underfunded.

Congress can take the next step forward to lock in future funding for farm and ranch conservation programs when it writes a new five-year Farm Bill next year.



Outdoor/Indoor Archery

ARL-FX IWLA Cub Run Archers



For those Chapter members who are interested in competing in Virginia Bowhunters Association (VBA) archery events, the Chapter established a VBA group called Cub Run Archers so field archery tournaments could be held at the Chapter. VBA is the representative

Limited Broadhead Use on Outdoor Archery Range

The indoor and 3-D archery ranges are for **field tip use ONLY**, no broadheads are allowed on these ranges. The
outdoor archery range does provide broadhead targets,
but only on the target butts marked in bright **RED** stating
"BROADHEADS OK."

These target butts are located at the crossbow station and include 20-, 30-, and 40-yard Rienehart walls ($4' \times 4'$

black target butts). There are also 2' x 4' target butts with **RED dots** that may be used for broadheads, and the **RED** cube dice at 50 yards. In other words, if there is a **RED** "BROADHEADS OK" sign or **RED dots** on the block target butts, these may be used for broadheads. *All other targets are for field tips only*. This includes any 3-D targets that may be placed on the range.

All core-drilling broadheads are strictly prohibited on the Chapter archery ranges.

Damage to the target blocks and 3-D animals on the outdoor range has occurred in the recent weeks. There is evidence someone is shooting core-drilling broadheads. Anyone witnessing broadhead usage on these targets, please notify the Archery Range officer or any Cub Run officer.

As stated on the ARL-FX IWLA/Cub Run Archers Web site range rules (Section 11 PROHIBITIONS—https://www.cubrunarchers.org/range-rules.html):

"Anyone observed ... shooting broadhead-tipped arrows at other than targets expressly designed for that purpose will be referred to the Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, IWLA, board of directors for disciplinary action."

Broadhead Rules

The Big Shot 41" Ironman target on the 60-yard target butt was destroyed sometime between August 28 and 31, 2022. We are unable to determine the broadhead type, but it totally destroyed the burlap cover. This \$500 target will now need to be replaced.

Just as a reminder, no core-drilling broadheads are allowed to be used on the Chapter archery ranges. This includes the Flying Arrows Archery Toxic and Cyclone broadheads.

If anyone has any information regarding this damage to the targets or knowledge of who is shooting core-drilling broadheads, please contact any Chapter officer.

When caught, this perpetrator will be brought before the Chapter board of directors and will face disciplinary action to include replacing the target.

Deer Processing Station

For Chapter deer hunters who would like to process their deer, the deer processing station is 20 yards off the Field Archery deck. The area is lighted and has running water from a garden hose located by the deck entrance. You will need to bring trash bags with you for proper disposal of all parts of the carcass.

When finished be sure to wash the area down completely, putting all remains in plastic bags before placing them into any dumpster. During cold weather, when finished be sure to drain the hose of water to keep it from freezing. Please leave the area cleaner than you found the area.

It is illegal to bring any deer taken from a Virginia Disease Management Area (DMA) to the Chapter for skinning and/or processing. Deer harvested in Fairfax, Prince William, or Stafford Counties are okay to process at the deer processing station.

Hit the Bullseye at the Junior Olympic Archery Program

Fred Bear, a forefather of American bow hunting once said, "The history of the bow and arrow is the history of mankind." Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, Inc., IWLA (ARL-FX IWLA) Junior Olympic Archery Program (JOAD) is the place to go to become part of a sport that has been around for thousands of years. We are a hidden gem in the middle of suburbia. We know there are people out there who shoot or would like to learn how and they have no idea we even exist.

The JOAD program utilizes four of ARL-FX IWLA's archery ranges. The indoor archery range has 11 shooting lanes at 20 yards. The main outdoor range is lighted and has targets from 5 yards through 60 yards. There are also two 14-point walk-through ranges with 3-D targets and field targets out to 80 yards, a total of 28 targets. Archery is an activity that can be done year-round. It is beneficial physically, increasing strength and coordination, and also beneficial mentally, increasing focus and building character and confidence.

Beside having access to all the archery ranges, JOAD members also participate in several archery events throughout the year. During the fall JOAD session, the participants are planning on competing in the Cub Run Archers' indoor World Archery Federation shoot in November. The 12-week session fees are \$110. The fees go toward range maintenance, new targets, and JOAD equipment. Members are also required to become USA Archery members.

The JOAD program is run by volunteers who are certified as Level 2 or higher USA Archery instructors dedicated to the sport of archery. Future plans for the JOAD program include establishing a session focusing on field and 3-D archery for the youth. This past Summer, the JOAD program hosted one adult class and two youth classes, and will do the same for the fall session.

Several members competed at the Scholastic Action Shooting Program (SASP) Nationals, the Civilian Marksmanship Program (CMP) National Air Gun Matches, and the USA Shooting 2022 National Junior Olympics Championships.

At the SASP Nationals in Marengo, Ohio, Suman Sanghera won first place overall in air pistol. Will Regala, Christina Alvarez, Nate Carbaugh, Caroline Tso, and Rebecca Stetter
